Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014

109 Functions and powers

- (1) The Maunga Authority has the powers and functions conferred on it by or under this Act or any other enactment.
- (2) In exercising its powers and carrying out its functions in relation to the maunga, the Maunga Authority must have regard to—
 - (a) the spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary, and historical significance of the maunga to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau; and
 - (b) section 41(2).
- (3) In exercising its powers and carrying out its functions in relation to the administered lands, the Maunga Authority must have regard to the spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary, and historical significance of the administered lands to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau.

[Emphasis added]

41 Maunga must remain as reserves vested in trustee

- (1) This section applies to each maunga once the maunga is—
 - (a) vested in the trustee under subpart 1, 2, or 3 of this Part;and
 - (b) Declared a reserve under any of sections 18 to 29, 33, and 39.
- (2) The maunga is held by the trustee for the common benefit of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau and the other people of Auckland.

Purpose

1. To consider adoption of the Tūpuna Maunga Authority's Draft Operational Plan 2026/27 (and summary).

Item 4.1

Background

2. The Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 requires the Tūpuna Maunga Authority and Auckland Council to jointly agree an annual operational plan and a summary of that plan for inclusion in council's annual plan.
3. Both the Auckland Council and Tūpuna Maunga Authority have completed consultation on Tūpuna Maunga Authority Operational Plan 2026/27 and the summary of the Tūpuna Maunga Authority Operational Plan 2026/27 including Annual Plan 2026/27 (annual budget).

Statutory Context

4. The process and any decision to adopt an Operational Plan, and summary thereof, is required to take into account the legislative and policy framework.
5. Section 109(2) of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 requires the Authority to have regard to the spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary, and historical significance of the Maunga to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau and that the Tūpuna Maunga is held in trust for Ngā Mana Whenua and the other people of Auckland.

6. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority's Integrated Management Plan was unanimously adopted (Mana Whenua and Auckland Council members) by the Authority pursuant to the Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 and Reserves Act 1977. The Integrated Management Plan describes a series of "Values" and "Pathways" that guide all activities on the Tūpuna Maunga.
7. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority (Mana Whenua and Auckland Council members) unanimously adopted the Tūpuna Maunga Strategies at Hui 50 on 25 September 2020. The Tūpuna Maunga Strategies are 7 key sections that outline the strategic direction with regards to education, Biodiversity, Tūpuna Maunga design, Recreation, commercial activities and monitoring. Together with the IMP, these strategies inform guide and manage the activities undertaken on the Maunga.
8. The Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 sets out a process for the adoption of an "Annual Operational Plan" by the Authority (refer sections 60-63). Management have worked alongside the council's legal and finance teams to ensure compliance with the procedures set out in the legislation.
9. The Authority administers the Tūpuna Maunga under the Reserves Act 1977 and pursuant to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014. The Hauraki Gulf Marine Park Act 2000 is also applicable in relation to Maungauika.

Introduction





Ngā Tūpuna Maunga o Tāmaki Makaurau

The ancestral mountains of Auckland

It is the rich history of Māori connection to the Maunga (volcanoes) of Tāmaki Makaurau / Auckland, unbroken over time, that sets them apart from any other volcanic landscape in the world.

As Māori established here, the Maunga were valued as natural places for pā (settlements), with their rich volcanic soils and their unique form and height for easy defence. The number of Maunga pā across Tāmaki Makaurau made it an important region of Māori social organisation and a main location for trade between tribes throughout Aotearoa / New Zealand.

The Maunga are central to the spiritual and cultural identity of Māori.

A defining principle in te ao Māori (the Māori world) is kinship. All the myriad elements of creation – the living and the dead, the animate and inanimate – are inter-related. All are infused with mauri (life force) and wairua (spirit), and all are related through whakapapa (common descent) from Ranginui (Sky Father) and Papatūānuku (Earth Mother).

In Māori culture, the people of a place are related to its mountains, rivers and species of plant and animal, and regard them in personal terms. Wairuatanga (spiritual

connections) between people and the natural world is an integral part of traditional Māori cultural practices.

Tikanga (protocols) have been established over time to ensure that resources are harvested sustainably and that the relationship with the natural environment remains balanced. The Maunga, as with all of the natural environment, are governed by fundamental values such as kaitiakitanga (guardianship), manaakitanga (care and generosity) and utu (reciprocity) which reinforce a sense of belonging and social cohesion.

To Nga Mana whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau (the Māori tribes of Auckland), the Maunga are living entities with mauri and wairua. They are regarded as Tūpuna (ancestors), and as taonga tuku Iho (treasures to be handed down the generations).

In recognition of the deep spiritual, cultural and customary connection between the Maunga and the Māori people of this land, the Auckland volcanic field heads New Zealand's working list for World Heritage status with the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation (UNESCO).

Redress and Co-Governance



The Tūpuna Maunga Redress

The Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Settlement is an outcome of Mana Whenua and the Crown settling historical Treaty of Waitangi breaches. The settlement recognises that the Tūpuna Maunga are taonga in relation to which Mana Whenua have always maintained a unique relationship and honours their intergenerational role as kaitiaki (guardians).

In July 2014, the Collective Redress Act was passed. The Act vested the Crown-owned land of 14 Tūpuna Maunga in Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau, on the basis that they are held in trust for the common benefit of the iwi/hapū of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau and the other people of Auckland.

The Tūpuna Maunga are owned by the 13 iwi/hapū of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau via the Tūpuna Taonga o Tāmaki Makaurau Trust.

Matukutūruru/Wiri Mountain

Maungakiekie/One Tree Hill

Te Tātua a Riukiuta/Big King

Under the Act each Tūpuna Maunga was declared a reserve and the Tūpuna Maunga Authority was appointed as the administering body for the majority of the Maunga for the purposes of the Reserves Act 1977.

THE EXCEPTION IS:

- Rarotonga /Mount Smart which is vested in the Taonga Trust and administered by Auckland Council (Regional Facilities Auckland) under the Mount Smart Regional Recreation Centre Act 1985 and Reserves Act 1977.

The Collective Redress Act also transferred the administration of the following reserve land retained in Crown ownership to the Tūpuna Maunga Authority:

- Te Pane-o-Mataaho /Te Ara Pueru/ Māngere Mountain – ownership of the land remains with the Crown and is administered by the Tūpuna Maunga Authority under the Collective Redress Act and Reserves Act.
- Maungakiekie / One Tree Hill Northern land ownership of the land remains with the Crown and it is administered by the Tūpuna Maunga Authority under the Collective Redress Act and Reserves Act.

NGĀ MANA WHENUA O TĀMAKI MAKAURAU

Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau is the collective name of the 13 iwi/hapū with historical Treaty claims in the wider Tāmaki Makaurau. The iwi/hapū are grouped into the following three rōpū:

- Marutūāhu Rōpū: Ngāti Maru, Ngāti Pāoa, Ngāti Tamaterā, Ngāti Whanaunga, Te Patukirikiri;
- Ngāti Whātua Rōpū: Ngāti Whātua o Kaipara, Ngāti Whātua Ōrākei, Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Whātua; and
- Waiohua Tāmaki Rōpū: Ngāi Tai ki Tāmaki, Ngāti Tamaoho, Ngāti Te Ata, Te Ākitai Waiohua, Te Kawerau ā Maki.

The collective approach recognises that the iwi and hapū have various shared customary interests within Tāmaki Makaurau such that a collective settlement approach is appropriate. It also provides for the greater exercise of whanaungatanga and kotahitanga between the iwi/hapū.

The sections for each of the Tūpuna Maunga within this document show the individual iwi and hapū customary association with that Tūpuna Maunga as recorded in the Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Deed of Settlement.

TŪPUNA TAONGA O TĀMAKI MAKAURAU TRUST

The Tūpuna Taonga o Tāmaki Makaurau Trust (Trust) was set up to receive the Tāmaki Collective cultural redress arising out of the Collective Redress Act.

The Trust receives, administers, manages, protects and governs the assets of the Trust for and on behalf of the 13 iwi and hapū of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau.

The Trust's Statement of Intent 2017/18 confirms the Trust's strategic objectives as:

- 1. Toitū te whenua, whatu ngarongaro te tangata**
Enduring protection and management of cultural redress properties
- 2. Tē tōia, tē haumatia**
A sustainable Trust that fulfils its purpose well
- 3. Toitū te kupu, toitū te mana, toitū te whenua**
A strong Mana Whenua presence and connection to cultural redress
- 4. Mā whero, mā pango ka oti ai te mahi**
Enduring relationships and collaboration.

TŪPUNA MAUNGA AUTHORITY

The Tūpuna Maunga Authority is the statutory authority established under the Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act to co-govern the Tūpuna Maunga. The inaugural hui was held in November 2014.

The Tūpuna Maunga Authority has six representatives appointed by Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau and six appointed by council. The Minister for Arts, Culture and Heritage may also appoint a non-voting Crown representative.

The Tūpuna Maunga Authority is independent of council and has its own decision-making powers and functions. Council is responsible for the routine management of the Maunga under the direction of the Tūpuna Maunga Authority.

The Tūpuna Maunga Authority's bespoke co-governance structure recognises not only the important relationship Ngā Mana Whenua have with these sacred places, but also their importance to, and connection with, all the peoples of Auckland. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority is a tangible expression of the spirit of partnership between Ngā Mana Whenua and council.

AUCKLAND COUNCIL

Auckland Council is responsible for the routine management of the Tūpuna Maunga under the direction of the Tūpuna Maunga Authority. It is responsible for the costs in relation to the Tūpuna Maunga and administered lands incurred by council and the Tūpuna Maunga Authority in carrying out their respective functions under the Collective Redress Act or the Reserves Act 1977.

Council must also provide the Tūpuna Maunga Authority with the administrative support necessary to carry out its functions and to exercise its powers. This responsibility is within the extent that funding and revenue for the Maunga and the administered lands allow.



Strategic Framework





TŪPUNA MAUNGA INTEGRATED MANAGEMENT PLAN

The Tūpuna Maunga Integrated Management Plan (“IMP”) sets the foundations for how the Tūpuna Maunga are valued, protected, restored, enhanced, and managed in the future with equal consideration and reverence. The IMP established a set of Values for the Tūpuna Maunga which are outlined below.

The IMP was developed in accordance with Section 41 of the Reserves Act to provide for and ensure the use, enjoyment, maintenance, protection, preservation, and development as appropriate for the reserve purposes for which each of the Tūpuna Maunga is classified. This single integrated plan replaces the former separate legacy reserve management plans for the Tūpuna Maunga.

The IMP was approved in 2016 following a public consultation process and can be read online at www.maunga.nz.¹

TŪPUNA MAUNGA INTEGRATED MANAGEMENT PLAN STRATEGIES

The Tūpuna Maunga Integrated Management Plan Strategies are the next level of policy development for the Tūpuna Maunga and aim to support the Values and Pathways in the Tūpuna Maunga Integrated Management Plan 2016.

The IMP Strategies was approved in 2019 following a public consultation process and can be read online at www.maunga.nz.

TŪPUNA MAUNGA INDIVIDUAL MAUNGA PLANS

The Individual Maunga plans (Maunga Plans) are the final tier of policy development and complete the series of documents as part of the Integrated Management Plan Framework. The Plans give effect to the Values, Pathways, Guidelines and Strategies and provide further detail with regards to the work the Authority is undertaking to enhance the health and well-being of the Tūpuna Maunga. The Maunga Plans are living documents that can be updated in accordance with future Annual Operational Plans.

The first 3 Maunga Plans were approved in July 2023. Further Individual Maunga Plans will be developed over the course of the current term of the Tūpuna Maunga Authority.

TŪPUNA MAUNGA VALUES

Within the Tūpuna Maunga Integrated Management Plan, the Tūpuna Maunga Authority has articulated a set of values of the Tūpuna Maunga. The values promote the statutory purpose of the Tūpuna Maunga under section 109 of the Collective Redress Act, where in exercising its powers and functions the Authority must have regard to the spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary and historical significance of the Tūpuna Maunga to Ngā Mana Whenua.

The values provide a strategic framework to guide the Tūpuna Maunga Authority in making any decision about the Tūpuna Maunga.

The values weave together and give expression to mana whenua and other world views, and the connections and histories in a manner that highlights the way in which these views complement each other and create a richness to the relationship people have with the Tūpuna Maunga and multiple ways in which these relationships are thought of and expressed.

The Tūpuna Maunga Authority Operational Plan

For each financial year the Tūpuna Maunga Authority and Auckland Council (council) must agree an operational plan. The plan outlines how council will carry out the routine maintenance of the Tūpuna Maunga (ancestral mountains) and administered lands under the direction of the Tūpuna Maunga Authority. This is a requirement under section 60 of the Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 (the Collective Redress Act).

The operational plan outlines the work programme for the financial year, which comprises of a number of projects at a network and individual Maunga level. Importantly, the operational plan sets out how these individual projects contribute to delivery of the Tūpuna Maunga Authority's

objectives and vision for the Tūpuna Maunga by linking them to one or more of the Tūpuna Maunga Values in the Integrated Management Plan.

This Operational Plan covers the financial years 2026/27, 2027/28 and 2028/29 in detail. Network-wide budgets are shown for a number of programmes. Once the guidelines and strategies and individual Maunga plans have been developed, these will be able to be further refined to show spend on individual Maunga.

This Operational Plan also includes the funding envelope for the third year of the Auckland Council 10-year Budget (Long-term Plan) 2024-34.

Tūpuna Maunga Work Programme 2024-34



WORK PROGRAMME OVERVIEW

In addition to expressing the objectives and vision for the Tūpuna Maunga, the values are the key driver of the Tūpuna Maunga work programme (see Table 1).

This work programme is a continuation from the Long-Term Plan 2024-34. This year's operational plan reflects the progress that has been made on this programme and includes further projects which have emerged from the Tūpuna Maunga Strategies.

The outer years of the proposed work programme foreshadow a change in the focus of the Authority as the significant CAPEX projects are completed.

Priority programmes and projects over the next 3 years include:

POLICY AND MANAGEMENT

- Develop individual Tūpuna Maunga plans to provide direction on how the Values, Pathways, guidelines and strategies should be reflected on each Tūpuna Maunga.
- Progressing the potential transfer of administration over certain Maunga reserve lands from the Department of Conservation to the Authority, and the potential transfer of the administration of land contiguous to other Tūpuna Maunga.
- Establishment of a compliance programme including a review of current and establishment of appropriate bylaws.

HEALING THE MAUNGA

VALUES:

TAKOTORANGA WHENUA / LANDSCAPE VALUE

- Protection and restoration of the tihi (summits) including reconfiguring space and provision of cultural infrastructure.
- Protection and restoration of historic kumara pits, pā sites and wahi tapu.
- Development of infrastructure to enhance visitor experience including provision of carparks, amenity areas, tracks and ancillary infrastructure such as wharepaku/ toilets.

- Removal of redundant infrastructure (built structures, water reservoirs, impermeable surfaces, etc) and returning areas to open space.

EDUCATION, COMMUNICATIONS AND PARTNERSHIPS

VALUES:

WAIKUATANGA / SPIRITUAL VALUE

- On-site staff to protect and enhance the Tūpuna Maunga and the visitor experience.
- Volunteer programmes to connect communities to the Tūpuna Maunga.
- Education programmes, community events and a bespoke website that celebrates the living connection that all communities have with the Tūpuna Maunga.
- Implementation of the Education Strategy to promote the values of the Tūpuna Maunga and the unique history and whakapapa of Ngā Mana Whenua. This includes exploration of visitor centre opportunities, connecting with communities of learning such as schools and the development of a communications strategy.

CULTURAL CONNECTION

- Development of a programme of work which enables Ngā Mana Whenua to express their living and unbroken connection with the Tūpuna Maunga. This may include cultural interpretation including distinct entrance ways, pou whenua, pa reconstructions, kaitiaki opportunities, and other cultural activities.
- Mana whenua living connection programme focusing on their role as kaitiaki (guardians), restoring customary practices and associated knowledge and enabling cultural activities.

BIODIVERSITY/BIOSECURITY

VALUES:

MAURI PŪNAHA HAUROPI / ECOLOGY AND BIODIVERSITY VALUE

- Restoration of indigenous native ecosystems; reintroducing native plants and attracting native animal species; removing inappropriate exotic trees and weeds (For context, see pages 58, 65-66, 71, 87,88 90-91, and appendix 5 of the amended Tūpuna Maunga Authority Integrated Management Plan, and at pages 7 and 34 of the Integrated Management Plan Strategies).
- Pest control on all Maunga in line with Auckland's plan to be pest free by 2050.
- Researching options to achieve efficient and effective animal and pest control methods, which includes a phased reduction in the use of herbicides and pesticides on the Tūpuna Maunga.
- Establishing a pest-proof fencing solution at Matukutūruru.

All projects are designed to deliver outcomes for the 13 iwi/hapū of the Tāmaki Collective and all the people of Auckland, enhance the mana and mauri of the Tūpuna Maunga and deliver improved open spaces across the eight local board areas.

They will also enable a compelling case in a future UNESCO World Heritage bid for the Tūpuna Maunga, which will contribute to a Māori identity that is Auckland's point of difference in the world. The bid for World Heritage status will require a dedicated resource and will continue to be progressed in this financial year in partnership with the Department of Conservation.

RECREATION AND ACTIVATION

The Tūpuna Maunga Authority plans various programmes to support Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau. Some key programmes for each Maunga and the administered lands discussed in this Operational Plan are:

- on-site interpretation/storytelling projects that recognise and share with visitors the relationships of mana whenua to the Tūpuna Maunga,
- education programmes developed, in partnership with mana whenua that help share the values of the Tūpuna Maunga and increasing support for the protection and restoration of these values,
- projects that work with mana whenua to identify and implement infrastructure and programmes that will support mana whenua reconnecting with the Tūpuna Maunga,
- a network-wide programme to work with mana whenua to identify, protect and heal sites of significance,
- general engagement and consultation to seek technical and landowner input into projects and programmes; and
- supporting events where possible including mana whenua cultural activities.

Funding, Revenue and Expenditure



Funding and revenue for the Tūpuna Maunga and administered lands may only be applied for the purposes of the Maunga and the administered lands.

Funding and revenue for the Maunga must be:

- Held and accounted for separately by council
- Applied by council under the direction of the Tūpuna Maunga Authority and in accordance with the annual operational plan

Every 3 years council must prepare and adopt a 10-year Budget (Long Term Plan) which describes the activities of the council and forecast expenditure and funding requirements for the next 10 years.

The expenditure and funding requirements for the Maunga Authority for 10 years are included in the council's 10-year Budget (Long-term Plan) 2024-34 are shown in Table 2.

This operational plan sets out the detailed expenditure and revenue for the 2026/27 and indicative financial information for 2027/28 and 2028/29. The annual operational plan for 2026/27 and the subsequent years fits within this funding envelope. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority manage the Maunga as a network. The individual Maunga sections set out maunga-specific costs for programmes and projects where these have been identified and scoped. The network-wide programmes require further project planning to determine how they will be applied to each Maunga.

Any budget variation associated with individual projects or network-wide programmes will be shared across the network in accordance with the priorities set out in Table 2 and kept within the total funding envelope.

OPERATIONAL EXPENDITURE

Net operating expenditure covers income and expenditure from day-to-day operations and services.

The operational expenditure shown in the individual Maunga sections is in future year dollar terms. The annual inflation rates applied are based on the rates used in the Auckland Council Long-term Plan 2024-34.

CAPITAL EXPENDITURE

CAPITAL DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS

These are for the creation or purchase of new assets, typically to address growth in demand, changes to the required Level of Service and to be consistent with the Tūpuna Maunga values and pathways as identified in the Integrated Management Plan. Any new Capital Project to be delivered are identified under each Maunga.

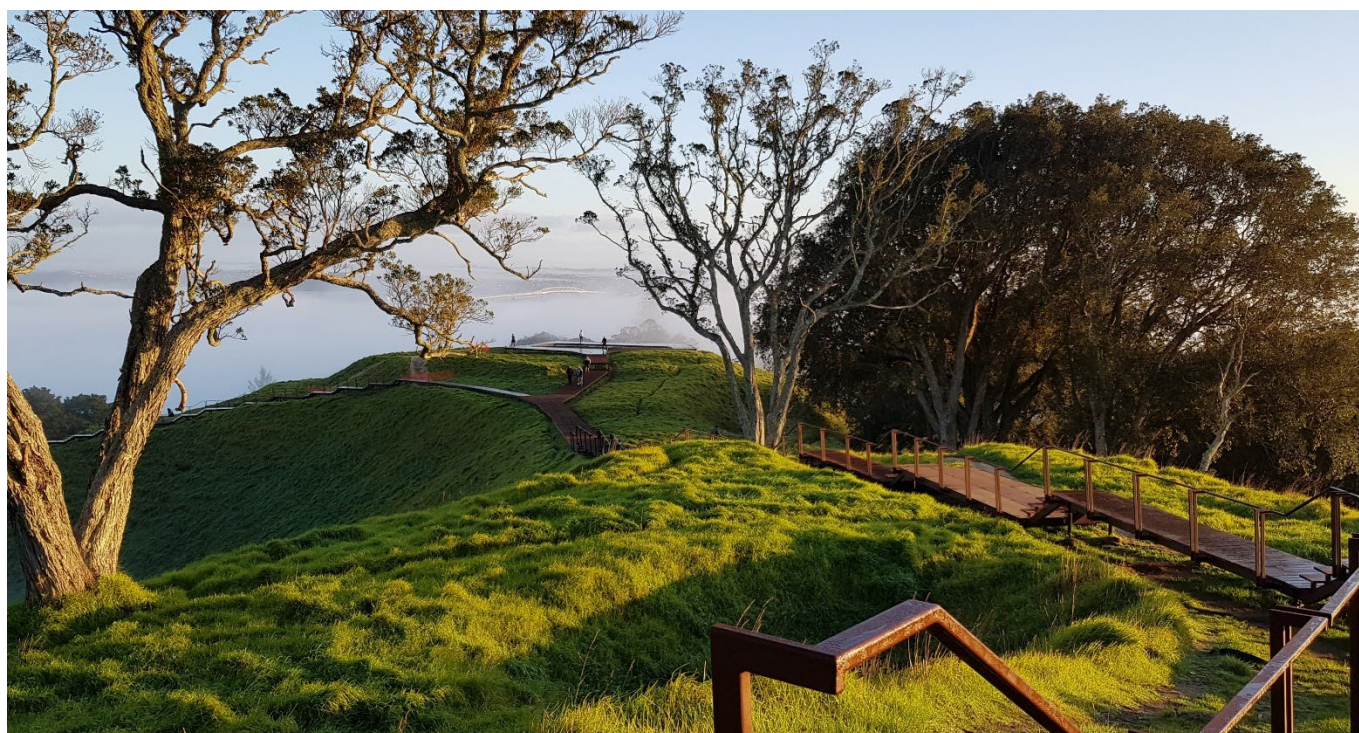

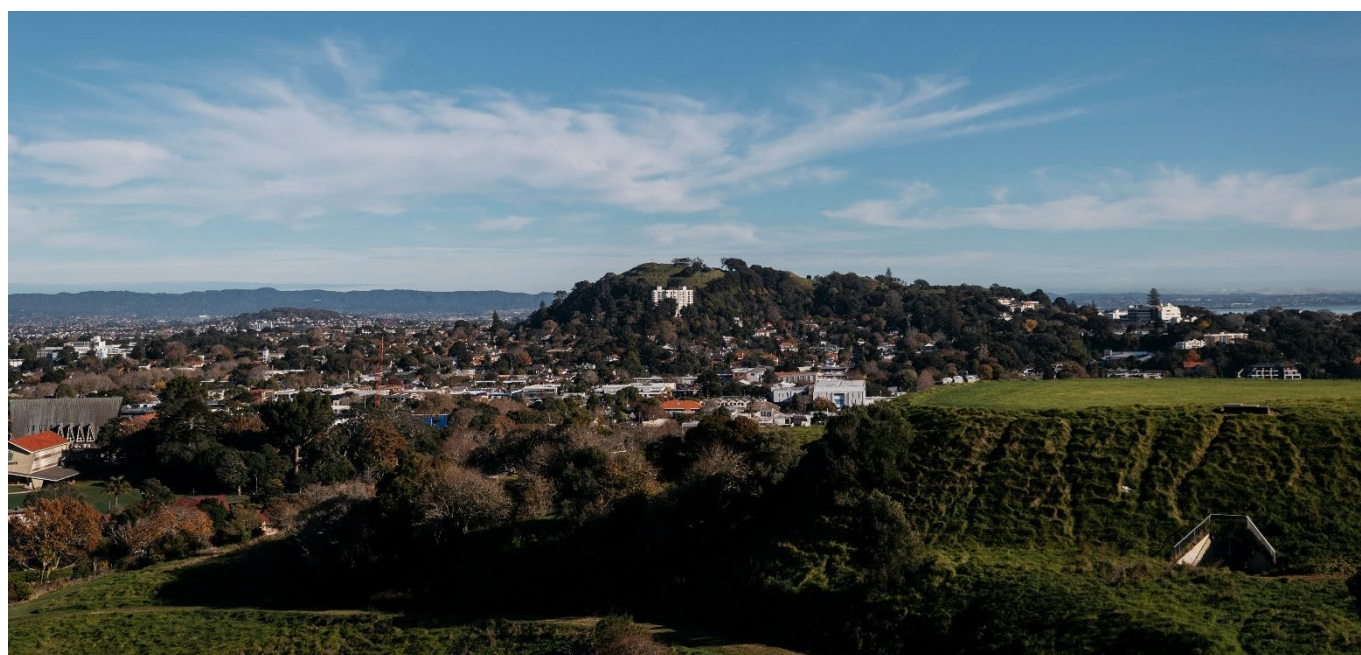



The Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 (the Act) requires the Tūpuna Maunga o Tāmaki Makaurau Authority (Tūpuna Maunga Authority) and Auckland Council to prepare an Annual Operational Plan and a summary of that plan for inclusion in the Auckland Council's Annual Operational Plan 2026/27 process.

The Tūpuna Maunga Authority and Auckland Council are required to approve the Annual Operational Plan. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority Operational Plan 2026/27 must be considered and adopted concurrently with the Auckland Council's Operational Plan 2026/27. A summary of the Tūpuna Maunga Authority's indicative funding requirements are outlined in this Section.

NGĀ MANA WHENUA O TĀMAKI MAKAURAU

Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau negotiated a collective settlement of their historical Treaty claims with the Crown. Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau is the collective name of the 13 iwi/hapū with historical Treaty claims in wider Tāmaki Makaurau. The iwi/hapū are grouped into the following three rōpū:

THE NGĀ MANA WHENUA O TĀMAKI MAKAURAU COLLECTIVE REDRESS ACT 2014

The Collective Redress Act 2014 vested the Crown owned land in 14 Tūpuna Maunga (ancestral mountains) in Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau. They are held for the common benefit of the iwi/hapū of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau and the other people of Auckland. The Tūpuna Maunga are vested as reserves under the Reserves Act 1977.

CO-GOVERNANCE

The Act also established the Tūpuna Maunga Authority, a bespoke co-governance entity, to administer the Tūpuna Maunga.

The Authority has six representatives from Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau, six from Auckland Council and one non-voting Crown representative appointed by the Minister for Arts, Culture and Heritage. The term of the Authority aligns with the term of the Council.

Under the Act, the Tūpuna Maunga Authority is the administering body for each Maunga for the purposes of the Reserves Act 1977, with two exceptions of Maungauika / North Head and Rarotonga / Mount Smart.

Maungauika / North Head has previously been administered by the Crown (Department of Conservation) but has now been transferred to the Tūpuna Maunga Authority. Routine management is now undertaken by council under the direction of the Tūpuna Maunga Authority in the same way as for the other Maunga.

Responsibility for administration and management of Rarotonga / Mount Smart remains with Auckland Council (Regional Facilities Auckland) under the Mount Smart Regional Recreation Centre Act 1985 and Reserves Act 1977.

The Tūpuna Maunga Authority is also the administering body for Te Pane-o-Mataaho / Te Ara Pueru / Māngere Mountain and the Maungakiekie / One Tree Hill northern land.

The legislation provides for funding and staff resourcing through Auckland Council. The Authority is currently supported by a core team of eight council staff across the Governance and Parks, Sport and Recreation units.

The scale of this co-governance arrangement is unparalleled in Auckland and the resulting unified and cohesive approach to caring for the Maunga has garnered widespread support.

STRATEGIC FRAMEWORK:

TŪPUNA MAUNGA INTEGRATED MANAGEMENT PLAN

The Tūpuna Maunga Integrated Management Plan (“IMP”) sets the foundations for how the Tūpuna Maunga are valued, protected, restored, enhanced, and managed in the future with equal consideration and reverence. The IMP established a set of Values for the Tūpuna Maunga which are outlined below.

The IMP was developed in accordance with Section 41 of the Reserves Act to provide for and ensure the use, enjoyment, maintenance, protection, preservation, and development as appropriate for the reserve purposes for which each of the Tūpuna Maunga is classified. This single integrated plan replaces the former separate legacy reserve management plans for the Tūpuna Maunga.

The IMP was approved in 2016 following a public consultation process and are available at www.maunga.nz.

TŪPUNA MAUNGA INTEGRATED MANAGEMENT PLAN STRATEGIES

The Tūpuna Maunga Integrated Management Plan Strategies are the next level of policy development for the Tūpuna Maunga and aim to support the Values and Pathways in the Tūpuna Maunga Integrated Management Plan 2016.

The IMP Strategies was approved in 2019 following a public consultation process and are available at www.maunga.nz.

TŪPUNA MAUNGA VALUES

Within the Tūpuna Maunga Integrated Management Plan, the Tūpuna Maunga Authority has articulated a set of values of the Tūpuna Maunga. The values promote the statutory purpose of the Tūpuna Maunga under section 109 of the Collective Redress Act, where in exercising its powers and functions the Authority must have regard to the spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary and historical significance of the Tūpuna Maunga to Ngā Mana Whenua.

The values provide a strategic framework to guide the Tūpuna Maunga Authority in making any decision about the Tūpuna Maunga.

The values weave together and give expression to mana whenua and other world views, and the connections and histories in a manner that highlights the way in which these views complement each other and create a richness to the relationship people have with the Tūpuna Maunga and multiple ways in which these relationships are thought of and expressed.

PATHWAYS

WAIRUATANGA / SPIRITUAL

- Restore and recognise the relationship between the Maunga and its people.
- Recognise the tihi is sacred.

- Rekindle the sense of living connection between the Maunga and the people.

TŪPUNA MAUNGA OPERATIONAL PLAN 2026/27

Each financial year, the Tūpuna Maunga Authority and Council must agree an annual operational plan to provide a framework in which the Council will carry out its functions for the routine management of the Tūpuna Maunga and administered lands for that financial year, under the direction of the Tūpuna Maunga Authority.

The Tūpuna Maunga Operational Plan 2026/27 identifies a number of projects to be delivered or commenced in the coming financial year and the subsequent two financial years. The Tūpuna Maunga Operational Plan 2026/27 also sets out the 10-year work programme and funding envelope confirmed through the Long-term Plan 2024-2034. The budget for 2026/27 and the subsequent years fits within this funding envelope.

PRIORITY PROGRAMMES AND PROJECTS OVER THE NEXT 3 YEARS INCLUDE:

POLICY AND MANAGEMENT

- Develop individual Tūpuna Maunga plans to provide direction on how the Values, Pathways, guidelines and strategies should be reflected on each Tūpuna Maunga.
- Progressing the potential transfer of administration over certain Maunga reserve lands from the Department of Conservation to the Authority, and the potential transfer of the administration of land contiguous to other Tūpuna Maunga.
- Establishment of a compliance programme including a review of current and establishment of appropriate bylaws.
- Development of individual Tūpuna Maunga plans which reflect the Integrated Values and Pathways, overarching guidelines and strategies for each of the Tūpuna Maunga.

HEALING THE MAUNGA

- Protection and restoration of the tihi (summits) including reconfiguring space and provision of cultural infrastructure.

All projects are designed to deliver outcomes for the 13 iwi/hapū of the Tāmaki Collective and all the people of Auckland, enhance the mana and mauri of the Tūpuna Maunga and deliver improved open spaces across the eight local board areas.

They will also enable a compelling case in a future UNESCO World Heritage bid for the Tūpuna Maunga, which will contribute to a Māori identity that is Auckland's point of difference in the world. The bid for World Heritage status will require a dedicated resource and will continue to be progressed in this financial year in partnership with the Department of Conservation.

Purpose

1. To consider an update on the buildings for terminated leases Northern Sports Car Club at Ōtāhuhu / Mt Richmond, Pigeon Mountain Cricket Club at Ōhūiarangi/Pigeon Mountain and Mountain Green Archery Club at Ōwairaka / Mt Albert.

Recommendation

That the Tūpuna Maunga Authority:

- a. **direct management to engage** with the Tūpuna Taonga Trust as whether they have any aspirations for the use the buildings.
- b. **remove** the buildings formerly of the Northern Sports Car Club at Ōtāhuhu / Mt Richmond, Pigeon Mountain Cricket Club at Ōhūiarangi/Pigeon Mountain and Mountain Green Archery Club at Ōwairaka / Mt Albert, but subject to any requests for use of such buildings by the Tūpuna Taonga Trust.
- c. **request** management to notify tenants of terminated leases of the Authority's decision on removal of buildings for Northern Sports Car Club at Ōtāhuhu / Mt Richmond, Pigeon Mountain Cricket Club at Ōhūiarangi/Pigeon Mountain and Mountain Green Archery, but subject to any requests for use of such buildings by the Tūpuna Taonga Trust.

Background

2. At Hui 101 (4 August 2025), the Tūpuna Maunga Authority resolved to terminate leases inherited from Auckland Council and its predecessors. Management seeks direction on buildings use going forward for terminated leases
 - a. Pigeon Mountain Cricket Club at Ōhūiarangi / Pigeon Mountain
 - b. Northern Sports Club at Ōtāhuhu / Mt Richmond
 - c. Mountain Green Archery Club at Ōwairaka / Mt Albert
3. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority's Integrated Management Plan (IMP) was adopted by the Authority in terms of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 and the Reserves Act 1977. The IMP describes a series of "Values" and "Pathways" that guide all activities on the Tūpuna Maunga. The primary focus of the IMP is to protect the health and well-being of the Tūpuna Maunga. A number of pathways that would allow for appropriate re-purposing of the building, for example, retaining the building as a space for community activities or operational purpose.
 - i. Under Wairuatanga / Spiritual, a pathway to restoring and recognising the relationship between the Maunga and its people is by making the Tūpuna Maunga places for all people to come together and share common aspirations for the protection and restoration of these landscapes.
 - ii. Under Mana Hononga Tangata / Living Connection - rekindle the sense of living connection between the Maunga and the people, give expression to the history and cultural values of the Tūpuna Maunga and Actively nurture positive relationships.

- iii. Under the Mana Aotūroa / Cultural and Heritage to support restoration of customary practices.
- iv. Under the Takatoranga Whenua/ Landscape Pathway, the IMP encourages the progressive removal of structures and features that detract from the Maunga.

Statutory Context

4. Section 109(2) of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 requires the Authority to have regard to the spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary, and historical significance of the Maunga to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau and that the Tūpuna Maunga is held in trust for Ngā Mana Whenua and the other people of Auckland.
5. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority's Integrated Management Plan was unanimously adopted (Mana Whenua and Auckland Council members) by the Authority pursuant to the Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 and Reserves Act 1977. The Integrated Management Plan describes a series of "Values" and "Pathways" that guide all activities on the Tūpuna Maunga.
6. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority (Mana Whenua and Auckland Council members) unanimously adopted the Tūpuna Maunga Strategies at Hui 50 on 25 September 2020. The Tūpuna Maunga Strategies are 7 key sections that outline the strategic direction with regards to education, Biodiversity, Tūpuna Maunga design, Recreation, commercial activities and monitoring. Together with the IMP, these strategies inform guide and manage the activities undertaken on the Maunga.
7. The Authority administers the Tūpuna Maunga under the Reserves Act 1977 and pursuant to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014. The Hauraki Gulf Marine Park Act 2000 is also applicable in relation to Maungauika.

Item 4.3

Discussion

Pigeon Mountain Cricket Club at Ōhūiarangi / Pigeon Mountain

8. The Pigeon Mountain Cricket Club (the Cricket Club) lease was a legacy lease was inherited by the Tūpuna Maunga Authority, it was originally granted by Manukau City Council and the lease expired in 2019. The Cricket Club owns and maintained the building that they currently occupy.
9. The Club occupies an area which is classified as a Recreation Reserve. The location of the Club is shown in attachment A.

Legal advice on Cricket Club building

10. Building reverts to the Authority upon termination, with no compensation payable to the lessee.
11. Alternatively, the Authority may require the lessee to remove the building and reinstate the premises.
12. If the lessee fails to remove the building, the improvements automatically revert to the Authority, who may then dispose of them at the lessee's cost.

Assessment of Cricket Club Building

13. In February 2022 we have assessed the state of the building. Overall grading is 3 out of 5. Building structure is in average condition, but as a result of insufficient maintenance over the years, repairs required externally and internally. Contractors have estimated an approximate cost of \$200,000 for the repairs. Building area is 124m².
14. Building is not suitable for relocation and building removal costs are estimated at \$83,300, the costs may not be recoverable from the Club.

Engagement with the Cricket Club

15. Management served the termination notice to the Club and will be working with the Cricket Club on an Exit Plan.

Engagement with Ngā Mana Whenua

16. Ngāi Tai ki Tāmaki expressed their vision to have this area revegetated.

Cricket Club Building future options

17. Retain/repair the building for hireage or lease. Further investigations would be required if this option is selected.
18. Remove building and revegetate area (recommended).

Northern Sports Car Club at Ōtāhuhu / Mt Richmond

19. The Northern Sports Car Club (the Car Club) lease was a legacy lease was inherited by the Tūpuna Maunga Authority, it was originally granted by Auckland City Council and the lease expired in 2021. The Club has built, owned and maintained the building that they currently occupy.
20. The Club occupies an area which is classified as a Recreation Reserve. The location of the Club is shown in attachment B.

Legal advice on Car Club building

21. Building reverts to the Landlord without compensation when the lease ends.
22. Lease also contains rights (not obligations) for the TMA to:
 - i. require Tenant to remove the Building;
 - ii. require an incoming tenant to pay the outgoing Tenant the value of the Building;
 - iii. Itself pay the Tenant the value of the Building if the Building has value to the landlord.

Assessment of Car Club Building

23. The building state was assessed in August 2025. Overall grade is 4 out of 5 and building area is 612m². Although the Club kept regular maintenance, the report suggest extensive repairs required externally and internally. Further specialist assessments will be required to assess external cladding, windows, doors and fire safety, the repair costs will likely be more than \$1m.
24. Building removal costs excluding carpark are estimated at \$140,150, the costs may not be recoverable from the Club.
25. Potential future use of the building would also impact on the second club on the Maunga i.e. venue hire.
26. During the opening hours, the carpark location attracts socialising, and litter is frequently left behind.

Engagement with the Car Club

27. Management is working with the Club on Exit Plan.

Car Club Building future options

28. Retain/repair the building for hireage or lease. Further investigations would be required if this option is selected.
29. Remove building and revegetate area (recommended).

Mountain Green Archery Club at Ōwairaka / Mt Albert

30. Mountain Green Archery Club (the Archery Club) lease was a legacy lease was inherited by the Tūpuna Maunga Authority, it was originally granted by Auckland City Council. At Hui 62 (22 February 2021) the Tupuna Maunga Authority resolved to grant a lease to the Archery Club for the initial term of 1 year and the lease expired in November 2023. The Club has owned and maintained the building that they currently occupy.
31. The Archery Club occupies an area which is classified as a Recreation Reserve. The location of the Club is shown in attachment C.

Legal advice on Archery Club building

32. The Auckland Council Legal team has advised that under the current lease, the Tūpuna Maunga Authority, as landlord, can require the tenant to remove within six months on expiry of the lease.
33. If the tenant fails to meet these obligations, the Tūpuna Maunga Authority can remove and dispose of the building and improvements at the tenant's cost.
34. If the Tūpuna Maunga Authority wants to keep the building for its own use, we can keep the ownership without compensation.

Archery Building Assessment

35. Archery building is a basic storage shed with water input but no power, the building is in poor condition with overall rating 4 out of 5. Significant remedial works are required to external walls and roof. The repair costs are estimated at \$100,000. Building area is 70m².
36. Building removal costs are estimated at \$12,782 the costs may not be recoverable from the Club.

Engagement with the Archery Club:

37. Management is currently working with the Archery Club on the Exit Plan.

Archery Club Building future options

38. Retain/repair for operational use to assist with Maunga Management i.e. volunteers shed for conservation purposes.
39. Remove building and revegetate area (recommended).

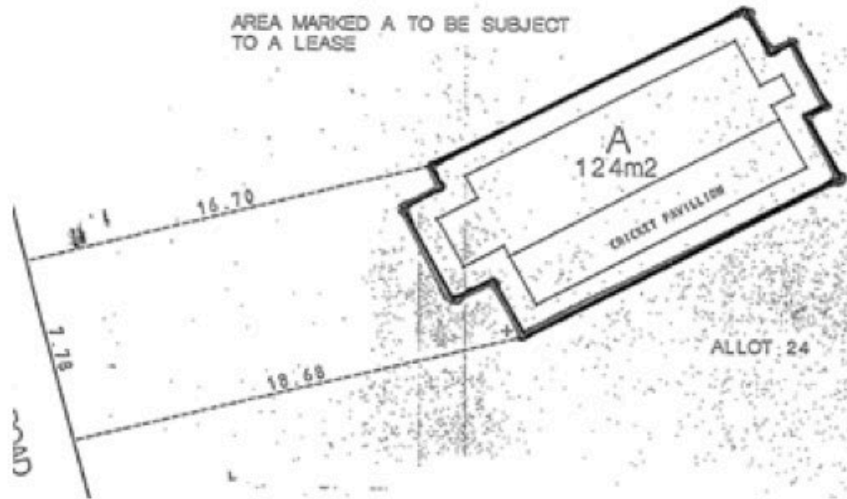
Next Steps

40. Engage with the Tūpuna Taonga Trust as to whether they have any aspirations for the use of the buildings.
41. Depending on feedback from the Authority, for the retained buildings investigate the use of the property for alternative purposes that may have benefits for the Maunga and report findings to the Tūpuna Maunga Authority.
42. Prepare a decision paper for the Authority.

Michael King Writers Centre Lease update

Purpose

1. This report recommends that the Tūpuna Maunga Authority offer Michael King Writers Centre a lease on Takarunga/Mount Victoria.

Recommendation

That the Tūpuna Maunga Authority:

- a. **delegate** to the Co-Chairs and Deputy Chair the power to execute a lease, including a Maunga Outcomes Plan, with the Michael King Writers Centre at a market rental \$26,000 (as determined by a registered valuer) and otherwise on the standard terms and conditions; and
- b. **delegate** to the Co-Chairs and Deputy Chair the power to agree to terms governing the termination arrangements of the Michael King Writers Centre should the Centre decide not to accept the new lease.

Item 4.4

Background

2. The Michael King Writers Centre (the Centre) lease was inherited by the Tūpuna Maunga Authority. This lease was originally with the North Shore City Council (predecessor to Auckland Council) and was drafted in accordance with that council's policy at the time. This legacy lease commenced in 2005 and will expire on 19 June 2025. Current rental amount is \$1.
3. The Centre occupies an area of Takarunga/Mount Victoria which is classified as a Local Purpose Reserve. The location of the lease area is shown in Attachment A. The building is owned by Auckland Council and Tūpuna Maunga Authority maintains the building.
4. At Hui 99 (26 May 2025), the Tūpuna Maunga Authority (Authority) resolved to grant a lease to the Michael King Writers Centre at the market rental of \$26,000 for an initial term of 1 year ending 30 June 2026.

Statutory Context

5. This paper relates to Takarunga/Mount Victoria.
6. Clause 2.3 of the Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Deed 2012 states:

“2.3 The Tāmaki Makaurau collective legislation will, on the terms provided by section 43 of the draft bill, direct the Registrar-General to record on any computer freehold register for each Maunga that the iwi and hapū of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau specified for that Maunga in table 1 of part 3 of the property redress schedule have spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary and historical interests in the Maunga.”

7. The Collective Deed Property Redress Schedule contains the table referred to in clause 2.3, and the iwi/hapū having spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary and historical interests in the Maunga are as follows:

Takarunga / Mt Victoria	Ngāi Tai ki Tāmaki Ngāti Maru Ngāti Pāoa Ngāti Tamaoho Ngāti Tamaterā Ngāti Te Ata Ngāti Whanaunga	Ngāti Whātua Ōrākei Ngāti Whātua o Kaipara Te Ākitai Waiohua Te Kawerau ā Maki Te Patukirikiri Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Whātua
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8. Any decision to determine management within a reserve must take into account the legislative and policy framework.
9. The Authority administers the Tūpuna Maunga under the Reserves Act 1977 and pursuant to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014. The Hauraki Gulf Marine Park Act 2000 is also relevant. The activities of the Club are consistent with the reserve classification.
10. Section 109(2) of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 requires the Authority to have regard to the spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary, and historical significance of the Maunga to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau and that the Tūpuna Maunga is held in trust for Ngā Mana Whenua and the other people of Auckland.
11. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority’s Integrated Management Plan (IMP) was adopted by the Authority in terms of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 and the Reserves Act 1977. The Integrated Management Plan describes a series of “Values” and “Pathways” that guide all activities on the Tūpuna Maunga. The primary focus of the IMP is to protect the health and well-being of the Tūpuna Maunga.
12. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority adopted the Tūpuna Maunga Strategies at Hui 50 on 25 September 2020. The Tūpuna Maunga Strategies are 7 key sections that outline the strategic direction with regards to education, Biodiversity, Tūpuna Maunga design, Recreation, commercial activities and monitoring. Together with the IMP, these strategies inform guide and manage the activities undertaken on the Maunga.
13. Section 61 of the Reserves Act 1977 sets out the Authority’s powers in relation to leasing on a Local Purpose Reserve. The activities of Centre are consistent with the classification of the reserve.

Item 4.4

Discussion

Leases on Tūpuna Maunga

14. The Tūpuna Maunga o Tāmaki Makaurau Integrated Management Plan (IMP) describes a series of values and pathways that dictate decision-making on leases. The IMP places the health and well-being of the Tūpuna Maunga at the heart of all decisions.
15. Any leasing activity must be consistent with the IMP Tūpuna Maunga values and should actively promote those values.

Michael Kings Writers Centre

16. The Centre provides temporary residency to support diverse New Zealand writers and promote the development of high-quality New Zealand writing.
17. The Michael King Writers Centre is overseen by the Michael King Writers Studio Trust. The Trust and the Centre were established in 2005, a year after historian and writer Michael King died in a car accident. The Centre receives approximately 130 applications per year for the 17 residencies that they offer and each year a minimum of two residencies are awarded to a Māori writer. In 2025 five Māori writers will hold a residency. They have now hosted residency to over 200 of Aotearoa's writers and in addition 100 writers who pay to stay.
18. Like with all Tūpuna Maunga leases, Management worked with The Centre to develop an outcomes plan. They have developed an information pack including TMA values, use dual naming, encourage writers to recognise the Maunga and Ngā Mana Whenua, maintain gardens and native plantings, promote Alcohol and Smoke Free policy.

Terms

Term

19. The Centre has demonstrated their contribution to the wellbeing of the Maunga and the values set out in the IMP. Management has a good working relationship with the tenant.
20. Given the above context management recommend lease for term of 5 years.

Rental

21. A market rental valuation has been undertaken by an independent registered valuer in 2024 due to the short timeframe since the start initial lease term it is recommended that the rental stays at the same amount at \$26,000 per annum.

Next Steps

22. If a lease is to be offered, Management will work alongside the Centre to draft a Tūpuna Maunga Lease for consideration and execution by the Chair and Deputy Chair

Purpose

1. To propose a residency at the Michael King Writers Centre at Takarunga / Mt Victoria.

Recommendation

That the Tūpuna Maunga Authority:

- a. **note** the report.
- b. **approve** the allocation of \$8,000 funding for the Tūpuna Maunga Authority Residency Programme for 2026/2027 and thereafter on annual basis, subject to a lease being approved by the Authority for the Michael King Writers Centre.

Background

2. The Michael King Writers Centre (The Centre) is overseen by the Michael King Writers Studio Trust. The Trust and the Centre were established in 2005, a year after historian and writer Michael King died in a car accident. The Centre receives approximately 130 applications per year for the 17 residencies that they offer and each year a minimum of two residencies are awarded to a Māori writer. In 2025 five Māori writers held a residency and in 2026 they will host 3 Māori writers. The centre have now hosted residencies to over 200 of Aotearoa's writers and in addition 100 writers who pay to stay.
3. The Centre occupies an area of Takarunga/Mount Victoria which is classified as a Local Purpose Reserve.
4. At Hui 99 (26 May 2025), the Tūpuna Maunga Authority (Authority) resolved to grant a lease to the Michael King Writers Centre at the market rental of \$26,000 for an initial term of 1 year ending 30 June 2026. Management is planning to propose the lease extension for further 5 years.
5. The Research Policy was adopted at Hui 71 (14 February 2022). The policy provides for an annual pool of \$10,000 for which students can apply to support their research. This is called the Tūpuna Maunga Authority Research Scholarship. The Authority has since awarded scholarship to 7 researchers working across various disciplines.
6. During The Centre lease negotiations process in 2025 management discussed unique opportunity to work together to provide residency to either
 - a. Mana Whenua Writers,
 - b. Research Scholarship Recipients,
 - c. Tūpuna Maunga Specialist Projects,
 - d. A one-week residency at the Centre was piloted in September 2025, where a Mana Whenua creative stayed at The Centre while developing creative projects.

7. The Authority administers the Tūpuna Maunga under the Reserves Act 1977 and pursuant to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority's management of the Tūpuna Maunga is guided by an integrated statutory and strategic framework, including the Integrated Management Plan adopted under the Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 and the Reserves Act 1977, the Tūpuna Maunga Strategies adopted in September 2020, and the Hauraki Gulf Marine Park Act 2000; together these recognise and give effect to the cultural, spiritual, environmental, and intergenerational values of tangata whenua, with a primary focus on protecting the health and well-being of the Tūpuna Maunga while guiding education, biodiversity, recreation, design, commercial activity, monitoring, and wider catchment connections to the Hauraki Gulf.

Discussion

Tūpuna Maunga Authority Residency Programme (TMA Residency)

10. The Centre offered to administer residency in partnership with Tūpuna Maunga Authority. Management has considered The Centre leading the programme, but a programme led by Tūpuna Maunga Authority will support more effective management of these taonga.
11. The programme is designed to support researchers, writers, creatives and specialists undertaking projects while connecting with the Maunga environment and wairuatanga.
12. The TMA Integrated Management Plan (IMP) and IMP Strategies set out key pathways to guide TMA decisions to support the residency programme
 - i. Tūpuna Maunga Values
 - Under Wairuatanga / Spiritual, a pathway to restoring and recognising the relationship between the Maunga and its people is by making the Tūpuna Maunga places for all people to come together and share common aspirations for the protection and restoration of these landscapes.
 - Under Mana Hononga Tangata / Living Connection - rekindle the sense of living connection between the Maunga and the people, give expression to the history and cultural values of the Tūpuna Maunga and Actively nurture positive relationships.
 - Under the Mana Aotūroa / Cultural and Heritage to support restoration of customary practices.
 - ii. Under Education strategy
 - Rekindling associations – Promote opportunities for mana whenua to tell the story.
 - Enable authentic mana whenua presence and building Mana Whenua Connection -

Mana whenua are at the heart of creating the cultural experience and explaining the values and significance of the Maunga.

- Education and information sharing programmes are proactive method of raising awareness, broadening engagement, collaboration and increase knowledge and experience on Maunga.

Residency Applicants

13. Each year The Centre will accommodate 2 TMA Residencies.

14. Candidates from the pools outlined below will be invited to apply

a) Mana Whenua Writers

- Mana Whenua Writers applications will be informed through the Centre application process. Applicants can indicate as part of their application whether they are part of 13 iwi and hapū Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau and with applicant's permission, The Centre will share applications with Tūpuna Maunga Authority for a decision.

- Management will send out the communications to Mana Whenua about the opportunity for TMA Residency.

b) Research Scholarship Applicants

- Following the submission of research scholarship applications, applicants will be informed to apply for TMA Residency.

c) Tūpuna Maunga Authority Specialist Projects

- Management will inform the suppliers delivering specialist projects for design, strategy and storytelling about the TMA Residency.

Funding and timeline

15. As part of the 2025/2026 Operational Plan, the Tūpuna Maunga Authority allocated \$54,504 towards delivering its educational strategies. Management proposes that a portion of that funding should be utilised for the TMA Residency and is requesting the Authority to allocate \$8,000 annually.

16. Funding Allocation: Funding would be allocated for The Centre accommodation and administration costs, and a stipend at living wage. Funding will be reviewed annually to ensure it reflects up to date costs.

17. Length of stay: The Centre offers standard two-week residency.

18. Timeline: Management propose that TMA Residency would align with the Research Scholarship and The Centre timelines, in August / September of each year that the fund is advertised, seeking applications from interested parties.

Evaluation

19. Applications would be initially reviewed by Management to determine their suitability and alignment. Management would then provide recommendations to the Tūpuna Maunga Authority to make a decision on the allocation.

20. Projects closely related for Takarunga / Mt Victoria or creating opportunities for Mana Whenua to tell their story will be prioritised.

21. Management evaluation panel is formed after application close with various subject matter experts.

End of Stay Reports

22. The residents will produce end of stay report that will be presented to the Authority. A standard template will be provided for consistency.

Next steps

23. If approved by the Authority, Management will work with MKWC to deliver the TMA Residency. The TMA Residency will be open for applications from 29 June 2026.

Purpose

1. To consider an updated Research Policy.

Recommendation

That the Tūpuna Maunga Authority:

- a. **note** the report.
- b. **approve** the updated Tūpuna Maunga Research Policy as set out in Attachment A to the report.

Background

2. The Tūpuna Maunga Research Policy was adopted at Hui 71 (14 February 2022).
3. The Research Policy states that the Tūpuna Maunga Authority will actively endorse research projects which align with the Tūpuna Maunga Values, as outlined in the Integrated Management Plan.
4. The Research Policy also states that it will create an annual pool of funding for which students can apply to support their research. This is called the Tūpuna Maunga Authority Research Scholarship.
5. Since adoption, the Tūpuna Maunga Authority Research Scholarship (Research Scholarship) has granted \$30,000 to seven researchers working across various disciplines.

Statutory Context

6. The Authority administers the Tūpuna Maunga under the Reserves Act 1977 and pursuant to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014. The Hauraki Gulf Marine Park Act 2000 is also relevant. Any decision to determine management within a reserve must consider the legislative and policy framework.
7. Section 109(2) of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 requires the Authority to have regard to the spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary, and historical significance of the maunga to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau and that the Tūpuna Maunga is held in trust for Ngā Mana Whenua and the other people of Auckland.

with a primary focus on protecting the health and well-being of the Tūpuna Maunga while guiding education, biodiversity, recreation, design, commercial activity, monitoring, and wider catchment connections to the Hauraki Gulf.

Discussion

Research Policy update

9. Building on the background and statutory context outlined above, the management team has drafted an updated Research Policy and now seeks feedback from Authority members to inform its refinement prior to adoption.
10. The proposed update to the Research Policy is intended to remove barriers to access to the research scholarship and to better align the policy with, and deliver on, the strategic direction set out in the Tūpuna Maunga Strategies.
11. Proposed changes include: 1) expanding the definitions of research and researcher in order to increase potential research scholarship candidates, 2) to clearly state TMA's willingness to enter in partnerships with value-aligned businesses and organisations for the purpose of funding research on the Tūpuna Maunga, and 3) include Mana Hononga Tangata / Living Connection Value as a value within the Research Policy.

Next steps

12. If approved by the Authority, the updated Research Policy will go into effect effective immediately.

TŪPUNA MAUNGA RESEARCH POLICY

Policy

1. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority has adopted a policy that:
 - a. all research conducted on Tūpuna Maunga requires a permit from the Tūpuna Maunga Authority;
 - b. it will actively endorse research projects which align with the Tūpuna Maunga Values, as outlined in the Integrated Management Plan (amended 2022); and
 - c. it will create an annual pool of funding for which researchers can apply to support their research.
 - d. when appropriate, it will enter into partnerships with value-aligned businesses or organisations, to support research on the Tūpuna Maunga.
2. The policy does not affect any research held as an “Authorised Cultural Activity” pursuant to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014.

Background

3. The Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 legislated the transfer of ownership of 14 Tūpuna Maunga to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau (the 13 hapū/iwi of Tāmaki Makaurau).
4. The Act establishes and appoints the Tūpuna Maunga Authority as the administering body for the Tūpuna Maunga under the Reserves Act 1977. In exercising its powers and carrying out its functions, the Maunga Authority must have regard to the spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary, and historical significance of the Tūpuna Maunga to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau.
5. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority is made up of 6 Mana Whenua representatives, 6 Auckland Council representatives and 1 non-voting Crown member. As the administering body, the Tūpuna Maunga Authority is responsible for decision-making and the governance of the Tūpuna Maunga and can implement its own policies on the Maunga.
6. The Policy applies to the Tūpuna Maunga being:
 - Matukutūruru/Wiri Mountain
 - Maungakiekie/One Tree Hill
 - Maungarei/Mount Wellington
 - Maungawhau/Mount Eden
 - Maungauika/North Head
 - Ōwairaka/Te Ahi-kā-a-Rakataura/ Mount Albert
 - Ōhinerau/Mount Hobson



- Ōhūiarangi/Pigeon Mountain
- Pukewīwī/Puketāpapa/Mount Roskill
- Te Ara Pueru/Te Pane-o-Mataaho/Mangere Mountain
- Te Kōpuke/Tītīkōpuke/Mount St John
- Takarunga/Mount Victoria
- Te Tātua a Riukiuta/Big King.
- Ōtāhuhu/Mount Richmond

Rationale

7. The purpose of the policy is to protect the sanctity, health, and well-being of the Tūpuna Maunga.
8. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority will endorse research projects which align with the Tūpuna Maunga Values because the research outputs will provide benefit to the Maunga, enhancing their mana and mauri.
9. The Authority administers the Tūpuna Maunga under the Reserves Act 1977 and pursuant to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014. The Hauraki Gulf Marine Park Act 2000 is also relevant.
10. Section 109(2) of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 requires the Authority to have regard to the spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary, and historical significance of the Maunga to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau and that the Tūpuna Maunga is held in trust for Ngā Mana Whenua and the other people of Auckland.

The Integrated Management Plan describes a series of "Values" and "Pathways" that guide all activities on the Tūpuna Maunga. The primary focus of the IMP is to protect the health and well-being of the Tūpuna Maunga. The "protection and enhancement of the mauri and wairua of the Tūpuna Maunga is paramount" (p57).
12. The policy is designed to align with the following Maunga values:
 - a) Wairuatanga / Spiritual. Relevant pathways for aligning to this value include: 1. Treat gently, and 2. Treat the Maunga as taonga tuku iho – treasures handed down the generations.
 - b) Mana Ao Tūroa / Cultural and Heritage Value. Relevant pathways for aligning to this value include: 1. Encourage culturally safe access.
 - c) Takotoranga Whenua / Landscape. Relevant pathways for aligning to this value include: 1. Protecting the integrity of the landscape of the Tūpuna Maunga, and 2. Preserve the visual and physical integrity of the Maunga as landmarks of Tāmaki.



- d) Mana Hononga Tangata / Living Connection Value. Relevant pathways for aligning to this value include: 1. Rekindle the sense of living connection between the maunga and the people, 2. Actively nurture positive relationships, and 3. Give expression to the history and cultural values of the Tūpuna Maunga.

Implementation

13. Management will regulate research permits to ensure the sites are well managed and do not conflict with other research or events.
14. Permits may be refused at the discretion of Management and may include any conditions necessary to protect the health and well-being of the Maunga.
15. Research permits may be subject to fees.
16. Management will have the delegation to approve research projects that are deemed low risk, meaning where:
 - a. an application is on the approved list of research projects (see 18); and
 - b. the methodology does not require any physical samples to be taken, such as the flora or fauna of the Maunga.
17. Research projects that fall outside of the scope of being low risk will require approval from the Tūpuna Maunga Research, Events and Commercial Activities Rōpū (previously the Filming and Events Rōpū) and will require Mana Whenua feedback to inform the final decision.
18. As per the Monitoring Strategy (identified in the IMP), Management is required to provide a list of research projects for students to undertake as part of their qualifications. This list is included as an attachment to this policy and will be subject to regular review.
19. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority will provide an annual funding pool of up to \$10,000, to be allocated to one or more applicants on the merits of their applications, subject to funding availability and prevailing circumstances.
20. Additional funding and research opportunities may be available through partnerships with value-aligned businesses or organisations. Additional funding will be communicated as a part of the annual promotion of the Tūpuna Maunga Authority Research Scholarship.

Definitions

21. In this policy, research' means any activities on or relating to the Maunga such as the collection of physical samples, the monitoring of conditions over time, experiments, creative pursuits, or any socially focussed studies which take place on the Maunga but fall outside the scope of an event.
22. In this policy, researcher' means a person or group of people who conducts research. Researchers can be a part of a formal research institution, such as a university or polytechnic, or outside of one, such as independent researchers, community researchers, or iwi researchers.

Māori Education Trust Partnership

Purpose

1. To consider a partnership opportunity between the Tūpuna Maunga Authority and the Māori Education Trust, to increase the overall amount for the Tūpuna Maunga Authority Research Scholarship.

Recommendation

That the Tūpuna Maunga Authority:

- a. **note** the report.
- b. **approve** the partnership between the Māori Education Trust for the 2026/27 Research Scholarship onwards as set out in the report.

Background

2. The Tūpuna Maunga Research Policy was adopted at Hui 71 (14 February 2022).
3. Alongside the policy, the Tūpuna Maunga Authority agreed to make up to \$10,000 available annually to contribute to research projects deemed to be beneficial for the Tūpuna Maunga.
4. Aims of the scholarship include:
 - a) provide opportunities for public to engage with the maunga as a space of learning and discovery,
 - b) support student learning, and
 - c) help gather detailed, site-specific information which supports effective management of the maunga.

Statutory Context

5. The Authority administers the Tūpuna Maunga under the Reserves Act 1977 and pursuant to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014. The Hauraki Gulf Marine Park Act 2000 is also relevant. Any decision to determine management within a reserve must consider the legislative and policy framework.
6. Section 109(2) of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 requires the Authority to have regard to the spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary, and historical significance of the maunga to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau and that the Tūpuna Maunga is held in trust for Ngā Mana Whenua and the other people of Auckland.
7. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority's management of the Tūpuna Maunga is guided by an integrated statutory and strategic framework, including the Integrated Management Plan adopted under the Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014

and the Reserves Act 1977, the Tūpuna Maunga Strategies adopted in September 2020, and the Hauraki Gulf Marine Park Act 2000; together these recognise and give effect to the cultural, spiritual, environmental, and intergenerational values of tangata whenua, with a primary focus on protecting the health and well-being of the Tūpuna Maunga while guiding education, biodiversity, recreation, design, commercial activity, monitoring, and wider catchment connections to the Hauraki Gulf.

Discussion

Proposed Partnership

8. Management proposes a partnership be entered between the Tūpuna Maunga Authority and the Māori Education Trust for the 2026/27 Research Scholarship onwards.
9. The Māori Education Trust (MET) was established as the Māori Education Foundation in 1961, under the Māori Education Foundation Act 1961. In 1993 the Māori Education Trust Deed superseded the 1961 Act, and the MET has been operational under that name since.
10. The MET have various partnerships with iwi, land trusts, and educational institutes, with an overall objective of encouraging Māori into tertiary education. Since 1963, the MET has awarded 65,000 scholarships to Māori students.
11. This partnership has the potential to increase the funding pool up to \$20,000, through the Māori Education Trust matching funding for Māori tertiary-level scholarship recipients.
12. MET's financial contribution is dependent on the amount of money that Māori applicants are awarded by the Tūpuna Maunga Authority. MET will provide equivalent funding for Māori applicants up to \$10,000.
13. The Authority will retain full decision-making power over the scholarship programme.
14. This proposed partnership with MET supports the implementation of the Education Strategy, through the promotion of the whakapapa of Ngā Mana Whenua. Additional funding for Māori applicants, provided by the MET, increases the opportunity for Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau to connect with the Tūpuna Maunga.
15. Management have worked on improving the scholarship based on feedback from the Authority at Hui 100, such as the addition of a fluent te reo Māori speaker and academic to the scholarship panel, to review applications in both te reo Māori and English. Management have worked with the Māori Education Trust to streamline communications, to ensure TMA brand visibility and scholarship ownership, and details on previous recipients have been added to the website.

Next steps

16. If the Authority approves this partnership, a partnership agreement will be signed between Management and the Māori Education Trust. This partnership will be implemented into the 2026/2027 scholarship round, which opens for applications on 29 June 2026.

Delegation to the Co-Chairs and Deputy Chair for licencing decisions under the Reserves Act 1977

Purpose

1. To consider and approve a delegation for Reserves Act 1977 licence approvals relating to Tūpuna Maunga, to enable timely and efficient decision making.

Recommendation

That the Tūpuna Maunga Authority:

- a. **delegate** to the Co-Chairs and Deputy Chair jointly, the power to consent to the granting of licences (as delegated by the Minister of Conservation) under the Reserves Act 1977; and
- b. **delegate** to the Co-Chairs and Deputy Chair jointly, the power to grant licences under the Reserves Act 1977 including, but not limited to, the powers under ss 54, 58A 74 of the Reserves Act.

Background

2. The Tūpuna Maunga are held as reserves under the Reserves Act 1977. The Maunga are presently held under three types of reserves: Recreation, historic, and local purpose.
3. Section 111 of the Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 provides that:
 - (1) The Maunga Authority may exercise or perform, in relation to the maunga and the administered lands, a power or function—
 - (a) that the Minister of Conservation has delegated to all local authorities under section 10 of the Reserves Act 1977; and
 - (b) that is relevant to the maunga and the administered lands.
 - (2) The delegation applies to the Maunga Authority with all necessary modifications.
4. Section 40 of the Reserves Act 1977 (the Act) establishes the primary statutory obligations of an administering body, requiring it to administer, manage, and control a reserve in accordance with the Act. This includes ensuring the appropriate use and enjoyment of the reserve, while also providing for its development, maintenance, protection, and preservation.
5. The Act also provides powers to the administering body to grant licences in exercise of those functions, subject to other statutory requirement like public notice and objections.
6. Licensing decisions must be made within the statutory authority provided under the Act, be consistent with the reserve's classification and purpose, and be exercised in accordance with the administering body's duty to administer, manage, and control the reserve under section 40 and consistent with Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014.

7. Under the Reserves Act 1977 depending upon the type of reserve (eg historic, recreation, or local purpose) the Maunga Authority may determine whether parts of the Tūpuna Maunga may be licensed for use, including commercial or other activities, with the relevant decision-making powers transferred from the Minister to the Maunga Authority. Licences are usually temporary grants to individuals or companies to carry out activities. Licences do not provide exclusive use of any reserve.
8. Management have become aware that there is presently no delegation to allow the determination of licence applications that are made between Authority hui.

Statutory and other considerations

9. Any decision to determine management within a reserve must take into account the legislative and policy framework.
10. Section 109(2) of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 requires the Authority to have regard to the spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary, and historical significance of the Maunga to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau and that the Tūpuna Maunga is held in trust for Ngā Mana Whenua and the other people of Auckland.
11. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority's Integrated Management Plan was unanimously adopted (Mana Whenua and Auckland Council members) by the Authority pursuant to the Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 and Reserves Act 1977. The Integrated Management Plan describes a series of "Values" and "Pathways" that guide all activities on the Tūpuna Maunga.
12. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority (Mana Whenua and Auckland Council members) unanimously adopted the Tūpuna Maunga Strategies at Hui 50 on 25 September 2020. The Tūpuna Maunga Strategies are 7 key sections that outline the strategic direction with regards to education, Biodiversity, Tūpuna Maunga design, Recreation, commercial activities and monitoring. Together with the IMP, these strategies inform guide and manage the activities undertaken on the Maunga.
13. The Authority administers the Tūpuna Maunga under the Reserves Act 1977 and pursuant to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014. The Hauraki Gulf Marine Park Act 2000 is also applicable in relation to Maungauika.

Reserves Act 1977 considerations

14. Section 54 (recreation), s58A (historic), and s74 (recreation, historic, and local purpose) provide the Authority with powers to offer licences for various activities on reserves.
15. Section 54 allows for licences to be granted for any trade, business or occupation on a recreation reserve.
16. Section 58A(1) of the Act provides that the Authority may grant licences over historic reserves for specified uses.
17. Section 58A(2) of the Act states that any such licence must be consistent with the preservation and protection of the reserve's historic, archaeological, cultural, and natural values.

18. Section 58A(3)–(6) of the Act sets out the procedural requirements, including public notification and the opportunity to make submissions or objections, unless an exception to notification applies.
19. Section 74 allows the Authority to grant temporary licences to occupy the Maunga.

Discussion

Licence application for the Tūpuna Maunga

20. Licensing matters arise regularly as part of the normal operational activity on the Munga, including licence renewal, minor amendments, and administrative approvals. These matters are often time-sensitive and may be constrained by the Authority's hui cycle, resulting in avoidable delays.
21. Management have received feedback from the public in relation to licencing and acknowledge that timing of the Authority's hui cycles can contribute to delay in progressing licencing approvals. In some instances, this creates a procedural constraint on routine, operational decision-making processes.
22. Management propose a delegation for licence approvals to enable timely and efficient decision-making, reducing delays between the Authority's hui cycles. All decisions on leases (which can provide exclusive and long-term rights and occupation on the Maunga) will remain with the Authority.

Delegation

23. Management recommend that the Maunga Authority authorises the Co-Chairs and Deputy Chair to make decision on licencing matters, including the approval and signing off licence under section 54, 58A and 74 of the Act. This would mean decisions could be made between Authority hui by the Co-Chairs and or Deputy Chair.
