*Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014*

*109 Functions and powers*

- (1) The Maunga Authority has the powers and functions conferred on it by or under this Act or any other enactment.
- (2) In exercising its powers and carrying out its functions in relation to the maunga, the Maunga Authority must have regard to—
  - (a) the spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary, and historical significance of the maunga to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau; and
  - (b) section 41(2).
- (3) In exercising its powers and carrying out its functions in relation to the administered lands, the Maunga Authority must have regard to the spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary, and historical significance of the administered lands to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau.

*41 Maunga must remain as reserves vested in trustee*

- (1) This section applies to each maunga once the maunga is—
  - (a) vested in the trustee under subpart 1, 2, or 3 of this Part;and
  - (b) declared a reserve under any of sections 18 to 29, 33, and 39.
- (2) The maunga is held by the trustee for the common benefit of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau and the other people of Auckland.

## Māra Hūpara at Te Ara Pueru / Te Pane o Mataaho / Māngere Mountain: Update

<b>Purpose</b>	To consider the development of detailed māra hūpara design plans for the Whānau Ātea / community gathering space at Te Pane o Mataaho / Te Ara Pueru / Māngere Mountain ('Māngere Mountain').
<b>Recommendations</b>	<p>That the Tūpuna Maunga Authority:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>a) <b>approve</b> the indicative design for a Māra Hūpara at Te Pane o Mataaho / Te Ara Pueru / Māngere Mountain as set out in Attachment A; and</li><li>b) <b>direct</b> Management to complete detailed Māra Hūpara design plans for the Whānau Ātea / community gathering space at Te Pane o Mataaho / Te Ara Pueru / Māngere Mountain; and</li><li>c) <b>delegate</b> to the Chair and Deputy Chair the power to approve final amendments to the Māra Hūpara design plans for the Whānau Ātea / community gathering space at Te Pane o Mataaho / Te Ara Pueru / Māngere Mountain.</li></ul>

### Background

1. The place space at Māngere Mountain is in need of redevelopment and its configuration does not reflect the Tūpuna Maunga Authority's values. As set out in the Tūpuna Maunga Authority Operational Plan 2019-20 Management have been tasked with this redevelopment.
2. Management note that the project will occur on the largely modified areas of the Maunga.

### Statutory and other considerations

3. This paper relates to Te Pane a Mataaho/ Te Ara Pueru/ Māngere Mountain
4. Clause 2.3 of the Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Deed 2012 states:  
*"2.3 The Tāmaki Makaurau collective legislation will, on the terms provided by section 43 of the draft bill, direct the Registrar-General to record on any computer freehold register for each maunga that the iwi and hapū of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau specified for that maunga in table 1 of part 3 of the property redress schedule have spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary and historical interests in the maunga."*

5. The Collective Deed Property Redress Schedule contains the table referred to in clause 2.3, and the iwi/hapū having spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary and historical interests in the Maunga are as follows:

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6. Any decision to determine management within a reserve must take into account the legislative and policy framework.
7. The Authority administers the Tūpuna Maunga under the Reserves Act 1977 and pursuant to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014. The Hauraki Gulf Marine Park Act 2000 is also relevant.
8. Section 109(2) of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 requires the Authority to have regard to the spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary, and historical significance of the maunga to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau and that the tūpuna maunga is held in trust for Ngā Mana Whenua and the other people of Auckland.
9. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority's Integrated Management Plan (IMP) was adopted by the Authority in terms of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 and the Reserves Act 1977. The Integrated Management Plan describes a series of "Values" and "Pathways" that guide all activities on the tūpuna maunga. The primary focus of the IMP is to protect the health and well-being of the tūpuna maunga. The "protection and enhancement of the mauri and wairua of the Tūpuna Maunga is paramount" (p57). As such the Authority must "tread gently" on the maunga to ensure that only appropriate structures are built. The provision of quality, appropriately located infrastructure that limit the disturbance of the Maunga supports Wairuatanga values of the IMP.
10. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority adopted the Tūpuna Maunga Strategies at Hui 50 on 25 September 2020. The Tūpuna Maunga Strategies are 7 key sections that outline the strategic direction with regards to education, Biodiversity, Tūpuna Maunga Design, Recreation, commercial activities and monitoring. Together with the IMP, these strategies inform guide and manage the activities undertaken on the Maunga. The Design Guidelines give the following principles to consider when developing new infrastructure:
- The tihī is the most sacred part of the maunga to Mana Whenua. The nature of activities and establishment of structures needs to be carefully managed on the tihī.
  - All development will respect and maintain, and where appropriate, enhance and restore the mana of the Maunga.
  - Development will be restricted to that which is necessary to serve the values of the maunga and the needs of both Mana Whenua and manuhiri (visitors) to the Maunga.
  - Development will be designed and located to minimise visual impact and to maintain the pre-eminence of the tihī, Maunga to maunga sightlines and volcanic viewshafts.
  - Development materials and structures will seek to minimise impact on the maunga and to achieve whole-of-life sustainability including a consideration of decommissioning.
  - Materials, colours and scale of development will be appropriate to the context and reflect the natural and/or cultural environment of the locality.

11. The Tūpuna Maunga are within the catchments that support the Hauraki Gulf. The purpose of the Hauraki Gulf Marine Park Act 2000, among other matters, is to “recognise the historic, traditional, cultural, and spiritual relationship of the tangata whenua with the Hauraki Gulf”.

## Engagement

12. Community engagement on the proposals was undertaken at the Love Your Maunga Day 2020, held at Māngere Mountain on Saturday 29 February 2020. Public feedback was encouraged through a series of interactive display boards showing the initial concept plans for the Whānau Ātea / family gathering place. The displays focused on potential recreation elements, amenities, entrances, and Tākaro (play-types) design aspects. Management were on hand to provide information on the proposals and to guide discussions amongst community members.
13. There was also the ability to provide written feedback, through a written questionnaire that asked people to indicate what they liked about the proposals and what was missing from the preliminary concept plans.
14. To facilitate community engagement on the potential design elements for this project at Māngere Mountain, temporary māra hūpara were installed on-site for the day. These temporary installations included features such as: tama-taiki (large woven balls for play), tuapa pou (sanctuary pou), taunaronā (tug of war), and tupekepeke (upright logs for jumping practice) and encouraged interactive play among members of the community.
15. Management has prepared a series of presentations to enable virtual engagement with the community. These presentations have been distributed to the Tūpuna Taonga o Tāmaki Makaurau Trust, Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau, the Māngere Mountain education centre, and the Māngere–Ōtāhuhu Local Board. The Project Team have also been in contact with the local kura (Mountain View School and Māngere Bridge School) to arrange to meet with the local taura representatives.
16. Management are exploring further avenues for receiving feedback and are considering holding an open day on the Maunga.

## Guy Fawkes Response Plan

<b>Purpose</b>	The purpose of this report is to outline a proposed approach to protecting the Tūpuna Maunga during the 2020 Guy Fawkes period.
<b>Recommendations</b>	That the Tūpuna Maunga Authority:  a. <b>commend</b> the protection measures for the Tūpuna Maunga during the 2020 Guy Fawkes period as set out in the report.

## Background

1. Fireworks are the number one cause of fires on the Tūpuna Maunga. At Hui 22 (21 November 2016) following further fireworks fires on the Maunga, the Authority formally opposed the use of fireworks on the Tūpuna Maunga.
2. On 5 November 2019, two large fires were started on Maungawhau and Maungarei as a direct result of fireworks. This resulted in the Tūpuna Maunga Authority publicly declaring that the Maunga will be closed during the fireworks period until such a time as the Government bans the sale of fireworks to the public.
3. In November 2019, several members of Auckland Council made a submission to parliament seeking a ban on the sales of fireworks to the public. Councillor Cathy Casey, in her capacity as a Ward Councillor for the Albert/Eden ward, was amongst council members who made the submission. Their submission was supported by the Tūpuna Maunga Authority.
4. In August 2020, the Parliamentary Governance and Administration Select Committee decided not to ban the sale of fireworks to the public. The Chairperson of the Tūpuna Maunga Authority then wrote to the Prime Minister expressing disappointment in the decision of the select committee.
5. In 2020, fireworks go on sale from Monday 2 November to Guy Fawkes Day Thursday 5 November. Management have been planning the most appropriate response to closing the Maunga for Guy Fawkes week 2020. In previous years the immediate days and weekend following Guy Fawkes has also been a time of increased fire risk.
6. If there was any doubt about the need for proactive protection of the Maunga, yet another fire occurred on 7 October 2020 at Maungarei – caused by fireworks.

## Statutory Context

7. Any decision to determine management within a reserve must take into account the legislative and policy framework.
8. Section 109(2) of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 requires the Authority to have regard to the spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary, and historical significance of the Maunga to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau and that the Tūpuna Maunga is held in trust for Ngā Mana Whenua and the other people of Auckland.
9. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority's Integrated Management Plan was adopted by the Authority pursuant to the Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 and Reserves Act 1977. The Integrated Management Plan describes a series of "Values" and "Pathways" that guide all activities on the Tūpuna Maunga.
10. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority adopted the Tūpuna Maunga Strategies at Hui 50 on 25 September 2020. The Tūpuna Maunga Strategies are 7 key sections that outline the strategic direction with regards to education, Biodiversity, Tūpuna Maunga design, Recreation, commercial activities and monitoring. Together with the IMP, these strategies inform guide and manage the activities undertaken on the Maunga.
11. The Authority administers the Tūpuna Maunga under the Reserves Act 1977 and pursuant to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014. The Hauraki Gulf Marine Park Act 2000 is also applicable in relation to Maungauika.

## Overall approach

12. Management have planned Guy Fawkes actions that take into account the risks relating to each Maunga. Management have engaged contractors to ensure, the week prior to Guy Fawkes, all mowing on the Maunga including firebreaks has been completed.
13. The standard Maunga vehicle access hours are 7am – 8.30pm during daylight savings. Dependant on the risk rating of each Maunga, from Monday 2 November through to Sunday 8 November vehicle access points will be closed to vehicle traffic earlier than usual to ensure that there are no vehicles present on the Maunga at sunset. Vehicle access will be closed from 7.30pm. Static guards will be based at main entrances from 7.30pm and patrols will take place from 8pm and all pedestrian visitors will be asked to leave the Maunga. Vehicle gates will reopen at the standard time of 7am.
14. Management have engaged an independent security contractor to provision a combination of static entrance security and mobile security patrols, ensuring significant presence throughout the week. There will also be foot patrols operating around the Maunga throughout each evening period.
15. To bolster on-site presence, Management have also approached Mana Whenua, community groups, lease holders, stakeholders and other community members to support protection efforts on Guy Fawkes Day 5th November through to Sunday 8th November from 7:30pm to 10:30pm. Management have developed a full health and safety plan to ensure people remain safe throughout. All volunteers will be fully briefed at the beginning of their shift and will be well supported by security staff and Authority management through the evening. One Authority staff member will be stationed at each Maunga in the role of 'team leader'.



16. Attachment A sets out a summary of the response actions for each Tūpuna Maunga.

### **Public Communications**

17. The Key Messages for the media and public are set out in Attachment B.

18. Authority management are working with volunteers to support the fireworks response. People can register volunteers by completing an online volunteer registration form.

19. Signage advising of the Guy Fawkes week closures, along with the usual 'No Fireworks' signage has been erected at all Maunga entrances during the week commencing 12 October, to give visitors advance warning. The signage also includes instruction on how to volunteer to help protect the Maunga.

20. A letter has been mail dropped to residents bordering the Maunga, again advising of the closures and the opportunity to volunteer. Also included is an update on fire breaks which have been mown around the Maunga perimeters in the lead up to Guy Fawkes week.

21. A media release will be issued on Friday 30 October to once again highlight the Maunga closures and the reasons for it. This date is optimal to help with exposure of our messaging as people prepare to purchase their fireworks and plan their Guy Fawkes week.

22. The media release will be published as a story on the Our Auckland website and will be shared through community and Local Board social media channels as well as the Authority's website page.

## Key Messages Guy Fawkes 2020

### Background

- Fireworks have been prohibited on the fourteen Maunga administered by the Tūpuna Maunga Authority since it was established in 2014.
- In the lead up to every Guy Fawkes week, signage is placed around the Maunga reminding visitors that fireworks are prohibited on the Maunga.
- However, every Guy Fawkes week over the last several years has seen one of more of the Maunga set ablaze by members of the public ignoring signage and recklessly letting off fireworks at the tihi.
- The massive 2019 Guy Fawkes fires at Maungarei / Mt Wellington and Maungawhau / Mt Eden, and other large fireworks-related blazes on Te Pane o Mataoho / Te Ara Pueru / Māngere Mountain in December 2019 and Maungarei in April 2020 year were the last straw for the Tūpuna Maunga Authority.
- These fires were serious, causing significant harm to these iconic taonga and posing a real risk to people and property, not to mention the strain on Fire and Emergency services.
- All Maunga will be closed to the public in the evenings during Guy Fawkes week while fireworks are still available for public sale. This announcement has been widely covered in the media.
- Guy Fawkes day is Thursday 5 November.
- Fireworks are on sale from Monday 2 November to Thursday 5 November 2020.

### Maunga closures

- Recognising that there is a heightened risk of fire-works related fires in the days before and following Guy Fawkes day (5 November), the Maunga will be closed to all members of the public from Monday 2 November through to Sunday 8 November, between the hours of 7:30pm and dawn.
- The following Maunga will be closed and will have a static security presence:

Maungarei / Mt Wellington  
Maungauika / North Head  
Maungawhau / Mt Eden  
Ōhinerau / Mt Hobson  
Ōtāhuhu / Mt Richmond  
Ōwairaka / Te Ahi-kā-a-Rakataura / Mt Albert  
Pukewīwī / Puketāpapa / Mt Roskill  
Takarunga / Mt Victoria  
Te Kōpuke / Tītīkōpuke / Mt St John  
Te Pane o Mataoho / Te Ara Pueru / Māngere Mountain

\*\* Te Tātua a Riukiuta / Big King and Ōhuiarangi / Pigeon Mountain are considered low risk and will not have a static security presence, though there will be security drive-by patrols through the evening.

\*\* Matukutūruru / Wiri Mountain is considered very low risk and will not be monitored by security staff.

## Implementation

- Security guards will be positioned at all entrances to the above Maunga from 2nd to 8th November between the hours of 7:30pm and 3:00am.
- Volunteers will be positioned at all entrances to the above Maunga from 5th to 8th November between the hours of 7:30pm and 10:30pm.
- All vehicle entrance gates will be closed and locked at 7:30pm and pedestrian gates will also be closed and locked where they exist (eg: Maungauika), to ensure no visitors enter the grounds.
- There will be a sweep of the Maunga at 7:30pm each night to politely ask any visitors to vacate the Maunga. There will also be regular walk-arounds during the evening to ensure no visitors are on the Maunga.
- Volunteers will receive a full health and safety briefing and will be well supported by security and Authority staff.

## Authorised Cultural Activities – Guidelines for Authority Management

<b>Purpose</b>	To consider proposed guidelines for Authority support for mana whenua who wish to undertake an “Authorised Cultural Activity” including tangihanga on Tūpuna Maunga
<b>Recommendations</b>	That the Tūpuna Maunga Authority:  a. <b>adopt</b> the Authorised Cultural Activities - Guidelines for management.

### Introduction

1. Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 (“Collective Redress Act”) supports mana whenua to carry out certain customary practices on the Maunga as “Authorised Cultural Activities”. Such customary practices may include tangihanga or hari tūpāpaku and the interment of tūpāpaku.
2. Management have considered proposed guidelines for how the Authority can support mana whenua who carry out “authorised cultural activities” and in particular who hold tangihanga or hari tūpāpaku or who inter tūpāpaku on the Tūpuna Maunga.
3. The draft guidelines in Attachment A are designed to support and facilitate mana whenua to practice their tikanga when carrying out “authorised cultural activities” including tangihanga on Maunga.

### Policy and Statutory Context

4. The Tāmaki Collective Deed of Settlement and Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 (the ‘Collective Redress Act’) contain a Crown acknowledgement of
  - a. the importance to mana whenua of cultural activities on and traditional uses of the Tūpuna Maunga;
  - b. the importance of cultural activities on and traditional uses of the Tūpuna Maunga as integral parts of the relationship of mana whenua with the Tūpuna Maunga; and
  - c. the desirability of restoring and facilitating the exercise by Ngā Mana Whenua of Cultural Activities on and traditional uses of the Tūpuna Maunga.
5. The Collective Redress Act sets out a process for how mana whenua may carry out the following “Authorised Cultural Activities” on the Tūpuna Maunga:
  - Erection of pou or flags;
  - An instructional or educational hīkoi;
  - A wānanga, hui or pōwhiri;
  - An event that celebrates the Tūpuna Maunga and volcanic activity as distinguishing and landscaping features of Tāmaki Makaurau;
  - An event that marks or celebrates the history of Aotearoa, Waitangi Day, or Matariki;
  - An event that celebrates the ancestral association, or exercises the mana, of Ngā Mana Whenua with or over the Tūpuna Maunga;

- An event that celebrates Ngā Mana Whenua in its collective capacity;
  - An event that celebrates an iwi or a hapū of Ngā Mana Whenua; and
  - Any other activity that is set out in the Integrated Management Plan (in accordance with s59 of the Collective Redress Act).
6. The Integrated Management Plan further defines mana whenua activities that are expressly permitted on the Maunga as follows (p85):
- Limited land cultivation for harvesting traditional food and plants;
  - Limited collection of other materials, including volcanic rock;
  - Archaeological activities;
  - Hāngi;
  - Tribally significant tangihanga or hari tūpāpaku and the interment of tūpāpaku;
  - Spiritual and cultural traditional practices and ceremonies other than the Authorised Cultural Activities;
  - Nohoanga;
  - The permanent erection of symbolic structures and signage; and
  - Activities that enable mana whenua to exercise their kaitiakitanga or manaakitanga, including overnight occupation Activities on maunga should take place in a manner which respects tikanga Māori.

**Authorised cultural activities (including tangihanga) and on Tūpuna Maunga**

7. Attachment A is a draft guideline for how Management can support mana whenua carrying out any Authorised Cultural Activity and in particular for tangihanga or hari tūpāpaku or interment of tūpāpaku on a Tūpuna Maunga.

## Draft Authorised Cultural Activities - Guidelines for management

### Introduction

1. This is a guideline as to how Tūpuna Maunga Authority Management will support mana whenua who wish to carry out tangihanga or hari tūpāpaku or to inter tūpāpaku on a Tūpuna Maunga including any other “Authorised Cultural Activity”.
2. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority notes that the Crown has acknowledged in the Tāmaki Collective Treaty settlement and in Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 (s65):
  - a. the importance to mana whenua of cultural activities on and traditional uses of the Tūpuna Maunga;
  - b. the importance of cultural activities on and traditional uses of the Tūpuna Maunga as integral parts of the relationship of mana whenua with the Tūpuna Maunga; and
  - c. the desirability of restoring and facilitating the exercise by Ngā Mana Whenua of Cultural Activities on and traditional uses of the Tūpuna Maunga.
3. Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 confirms that mana whenua may carry out “Authorised Cultural Activities” on the Tūpuna Maunga. The Integrated Management Plan of the Authority sets out that this right includes various activities such as tangihanga or hari tūpāpaku and the interment of tūpāpaku (p85).
4. Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 sets out a legal process for approvals for Authorised Cultural Activities. As such these guidelines cannot change or amend any such legal or other requirement arising out of the Tāmaki Collective Treaty Settlement nor Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014.
5. Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 requires that in each financial year the Annual Operational Plan must include information relating to the “facilitation of authorised cultural activities” (s60(4)(h)).
6. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority directs Management to provide facilitation to mana whenua in terms of the Annual Operational Plan and as set out in these guidelines and requires that such support should enable mana whenua to achieve their proposed cultural activity.

### Authorised Cultural Activities

7. If requested by mana whenua, Tūpuna Maunga Authority Management will assist and provide advice on the process for the granting of any approval to carry out an Authorised Cultural Activity as set out in Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014.
8. If requested by mana whenua, Tūpuna Maunga Authority Management will:
  - a. assist with any engagement with the Tūpuna Taonga Trust in relation to obtaining any approval required for an Authorised Cultural Activity;

- b. obtain advice from archaeological or other specialists on suggested ideal locations for the proposed activity to take place;
- c. help with any advice on compliance with the relevant provisions of the Integrated Management Plan, Maunga Strategies, or any Individual Maunga Plan;
- d. help with any advice on compliance with the Resource Management Act 1991;
- e. help with any advice on permits or authorisations as may be required under legislation such as the Reserves Act 1977, the Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga Act 2014, the Burial and Cremation Act 1964, and the Health Act 1956.

**Support for mana whenua prior to and during an Authorised Cultural Activity taking place**

- 9. If requested by mana whenua, Tūpuna Maunga Authority Management will provide such operational support as practicably possible within available budget prior to the carrying out of an Authorised Cultural Activity including a tangihanga or hari tūpāpaku or to interment of tūpāpaku on a Tūpuna Maunga. Such operational support may include:
  - a. Advice and assistance with Health and Safety planning for attendees, Management, and the public as necessary;
  - b. Liaison with any lessees or other right-holders on Maunga;
  - c. Liaison with any Tūpuna Maunga Authority contractors on the Maunga;
  - d. Any such event management and logistics planning and actions as might be required;
  - e. Special support for kaumātua attendees as may be requested;
  - f. Traffic management planning and advice and enactment;
  - g. Assistance with the guiding of the public or if necessary the closure of public access to part of the Maunga to support the Authorised Cultural Activity;
  - h. Other such facilitation as may be requested where it is practicable and achievable with available budget;
  - i. Supply and use of such facilities or materials as the Authority might hold.

**Support for mana whenua following an Authorised Cultural Activity.**

- 10. If requested by mana whenua, following a tangihanga or hari tūpāpaku or the interment of tūpāpaku Tūpuna Maunga Authority Management will:
  - a. Assist with lock down or clean-up as may be required;
  - b. Liaison with any external agency in relation to reporting on the activity as required by a permit or any statutory authorisation.
