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Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014

109 Functions and powers

- (1) The Maunga Authority has the powers and functions conferred on it by or under this Act or any other enactment.
- (2) In exercising its powers and carrying out its functions in relation to the maunga, the Maunga Authority must have regard to—
 - (a) the spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary, and historical significance of the maunga to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau; and
 - (b) section 41(2).
- (3) In exercising its powers and carrying out its functions in relation to the administered lands, the Maunga Authority must have regard to the spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary, and historical significance of the administered lands to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau.

41 Maunga must remain as reserves vested in trustee

- (1) This section applies to each maunga once the maunga is—
 - (a) vested in the trustee under subpart 1, 2, or 3 of this Part;and
 - (b) Declared a reserve under any of sections 18 to 29, 33, and 39.
- (2) The maunga is held by the trustee for the common benefit of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau and the other people of Auckland.

Ōtāhuhu Rovers Rugby League Lease Update

Purpose

1. To consider a potential lease to the Ōtāhuhu Rovers Rugby League Club Lease on Ōtāhuhu / Mt Richmond.

Recommendation

That the Tūpuna Maunga Authority:

- a. tuku / grant, subject to completion of statutory processes, including public notification under s119 of the Reserves Act 1977, a lease to Ōtāhuhu Rovers Rugby League Club (Attachment A) subject to the following terms and conditions
 - i. term – Five (5) years, commencing on 1 October 2026.
 - ii. Rent at a market rental \$5,880 per annum (as determined by a registered valuer)
 - iii. Maunga Outcomes plan be prepared and attached as a schedule to the lease agreement
 - iv. all other terms and conditions in accordance with Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 and the Reserves Act 1977 and the Tūpuna Maunga Authority standard form lease agreement.
- b. if required, tāpae / delegate to the Co-Chairs and Deputy Chair the power to appoint a hearings panel pursuant s 120 of the Reserves Act 1977 to consider and hear any submissions received and make a decision on the lease.
- c. tāpae / delegate to the Co-Chairs and Deputy Chair the power to execute a lease, including a Maunga Outcomes Plan, with lessee on the terms and conditions set out in resolution.
- d. tāpae / delegate to the Co-Chairs and Deputy Chair the power to agree to terms governing the termination arrangements of lessee should they decide not to accept the new lease.

Item 4.1

Background

2. At Hui 50 (25 September 2019) the Tūpuna Maunga Authority resolved to grant a renewal of lease for the last term of 5 years with the final expiry date 31 August 2023.
3. The Club occupies an area of Ōtāhuhu / Mt Richmond which is classified as a Recreation Reserve. The proposed lease area is shown in red of the Attachment A. The Club owns and maintains the building that they occupy.

Statutory Context

4. Any decision to determine management within a reserve must take into account the legislative and policy framework.

5. The Authority administers the Tūpuna Maunga under the Reserves Act 1977 and pursuant to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014. The Hauraki Gulf Marine Park Act 2000 is also relevant. The activities of the Scouts are consistent with the reserve classification.
6. Section 109(2) of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 requires the Authority to have regard to the spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary, and historical significance of the maunga to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau and that the tūpuna maunga is held in trust for Ngā Mana Whenua and the other people of Auckland.
7. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority's Integrated Management Plan (IMP) was adopted by the Authority in terms of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 and the Reserves Act 1977. The Integrated Management Plan describes a series of "Values" and "Pathways" that guide all activities on the Tūpuna Maunga. The primary focus of the IMP is to protect the health and well-being of the Tūpuna Maunga.
8. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority adopted the Tūpuna Maunga Strategies at Hui 50 on 25 September 2020. The Tūpuna Maunga Strategies are 7 key sections that outline the strategic direction with regards to education, Biodiversity, Tūpuna Maunga design, Recreation, commercial activities and monitoring. Together with the IMP, these strategies inform guide and manage the activities undertaken on the Maunga.

Reserves Act 1977 considerations

9. Section 54 of the Reserves Act 1977 sets out the Authority's powers in relation to leasing on a recreation reserve.
10. There is a requirement to publicly notify an intention to lease land within a Recreation Reserve.
11. Section 53(1) of the Reserves Act allows the Authority to prescribe the games, sports and other activities for public recreation that may take place in any specified part of the Reserve. This section also allows the Authority to grant organisations exclusive use of parts of the reserve for a sporting or recreation purpose.

Discussion

Leases on Tūpuna Maunga

12. The Tūpuna Maunga o Tāmaki Makaurau Integrated Management Plan (IMP) describes a series of values and pathways that dictate decision-making on leases. The IMP places the health and well-being of the Tūpuna Maunga at the heart of all decisions.
13. Any leasing activity must be consistent with the IMP Tūpuna Maunga values and should actively promote those values. One step is a Maunga Outcomes Plan which forms part of all leases on Tūpuna Maunga.

Rugby Club

14. The club is well established with the proud history, it is internationally recognised as the most successful rugby league club in New Zealand having produced 49 Kiwi's, 11 Auckland Warriors, 14 Kiwi Ferns, 4 Warriors Women's Team as well as a host of NRL and Super League players since it was first founded in 1911. The club has 36 teams at

Item 4.1

Ōtāhuhu from 4/5yrs old to 60/70yrs old: 290 mini mod players from Under 6 to Under 12, 213 youth players from U13 to U16, 147 Senior player U17 up to Marsters oldest is about 70, 140 Coaches and a total of 40 Life members. They have been on the Maunga since 1969.

15. Maunga Outcomes Plan - The Club promotes club as a family club with shared values that align Tūpuna Maunga. Implemented pest control measures, rubbish pick-ups to help protect fauna and flora.

Key Terms

16. Term: The Club has completed their Maunga Outcomes plan demonstrated their contribution to the wellbeing of the Maunga and the values set out in the IMP. Given the above context management recommend a term of 5 years commencing on 1 October 2026.
17. Rental: Rental assessment has been done by the registered valuer in May 2025 at \$5,880 per annum.

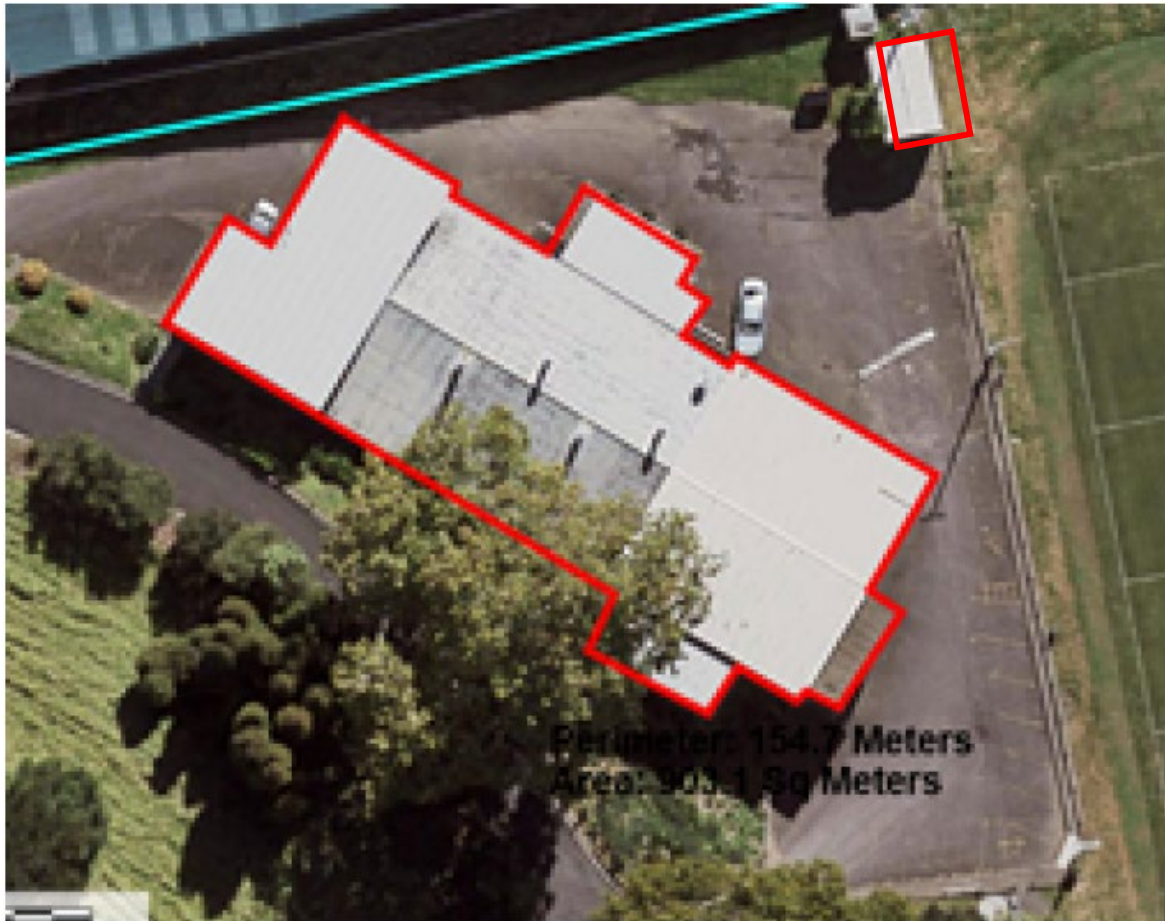
18. If a lease is to be offered, management will engage in public notification process.

Maungawhau / Mount Eden – Batger Road Secondary Track Upgrade

Purpose

1. To present a recommended option for the upgrade of the Batger Road secondary track network on Maungawhau / Mount Eden.

Recommendation

That the Tūpuna Maunga Authority:

- a. whakaae / approve proceeding with the proposed track upgrade and boardwalks along the Batger road track on Maungawhau Mt Eden as confirmed by management.

Background

2. The Batger Road secondary track network travels around the lower Southern and Eastern flanks of Maungawhau. Despite recent upgrades, the track is experiencing progressive deterioration and does not meet the Authority's adopted track standard. At Hui 105 (25 May 2026) the Authority considered options to upgrade the track.
3. The tracks traverse sensitive slopes of Maungawhau, including areas of archaeological and cultural significance. Continued degradation risks further disturbance to the Maunga and increased lifecycle costs.

Statutory Context

4. Any decision to determine management within a reserve must take into account the legislative and policy framework.
5. The Authority administers the Tūpuna Maunga under the Reserves Act 1977 and pursuant to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014. The Hauraki Gulf Marine Park Act 2000 is also relevant. The activities of the Scouts are consistent with the reserve classification.
6. Item 4.2

8. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority adopted the Tūpuna Maunga Strategies at Hui 50 on 25 September 2020. The Tūpuna Maunga Strategies are 7 key sections that outline the strategic direction with regards to education, Biodiversity, Tūpuna Maunga design, Recreation, commercial activities and monitoring. Together with the IMP, these strategies inform guide and manage the activities undertaken on the Maunga.

Discussion

9. The key issues are:

- i. Ongoing erosion and surface instability
- ii. Drainage failure and material migration
- iii. Safety risks including trip hazards and fall exposure
- iv. Inefficient recurring maintenance
- v. Emerging structural risk associated with the existing MSE retaining wall

10. Two options were developed for the Batger Road secondary track upgrade, balancing long-term durability with cultural and environmental sensitivity. Both involve the construction of a boardwalk to lift the track surface above the mobile scoria slopes. One also involves realigning the track.
11. The boardwalks are proposed to be 1.2m wide timber-framed boardwalks, with timber decking and driven timber foundations. Because they traverse an old quarry site the underlying ground is already modified so we are not proposing screw-pile foundations.
12. At Hui 105 the Authority considered both options and expressed a preference for Option Two as it minimised new construction impact on possibly sensitive areas. Attachment A presents the proposed alignment and track construction techniques for the preferred option.
13. The recommended option retains the existing track alignment but lifts the track onto approximately 140m of low, new boardwalk sections. In doing so it:
- i. Maintains the cultural and visual integrity of the Maunga,
 - ii. Focuses erosion and drainage interventions only where strictly necessary,
 - iii. Meets long-term structural and safety objectives, and
 - iv. Minimizes landscape impact while delivering a durable, cost-effective solution.

Recommendation

14. Both options deliver the key benefits of the long-term upgrade: improved safety, reduced lifecycle cost, mitigation of retaining wall risk, and protection of the mauri and wairua. Option 2 is recommended as it achieves the required structural outcomes while preserving the existing alignment and minimising intrusion on sensitive areas.

Financial Considerations

15. The estimated total project cost for either option is between \$1.5M and \$1.7M. Funding will be sought through the annual operation plan process.

Next steps

16. Management will progress the designs and programme the works for construction.

Hui 106	Te Tātua-a-Riukiuta	While the Green by Nature kaimahi was undertaking bamboo removal works on Te Tātua a Riukiuta adjacent to the Connolly Avenue footpath, the kaimahi sustained lacerations and cuts to both forearms while cutting bamboo back from the maunga bank to improve access along the footpath leading to the residential cul-de-sac. The kaimahi observed abrasions to their forearms following the incident.		The incident was assessed as a preventable minor injury. Existing controls were reviewed and additional preventative measures have been recommended to reduce the likelihood of similar incidents occurring during future vegetation maintenance activities.	Injuries to kaimahi were sustained from this incident.	A toolbox talk will be undertaken with all kaimahi involved in vegetation maintenance activities on the maunga, focusing on vegetation removal hazards, correct PPE use, safe cutting techniques, and the requirement to complete a pre-start risk assessment before commencing similar works. This will help minimise the likelihood of further laceration injuries while maintaining safe access and environmental outcomes.
Hui 105	Maungawhau	On 1 May, an incident occurred where a parked van on the Clive Road exit had its back window smashed and broken into. She was a tourist, and it appears that her possessions were found nearby and thrown in the rubbish bin at the hospital.		The tourist reported the incident to the police.	Potential risk to manuhiri.	Management is considering signage to raise awareness and prevent similar incidents from occurring again.
Hui 103	Maungawhau	Serious incident in the afternoon on 5 February involving two pedestrians and a vehicle which resulted in injuries. A tourist minibus/van was disembarking passengers behind the toilet block, where a car was following closely behind. While the pedestrians were crossing the road, two of them were hit by the car.
