The Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 (the Act) requires the Tūpuna Maunga o Tāmaki Makaurau Authority (Tūpuna Maunga Authority) and Auckland Council to prepare an Annual Operational Plan and a summary of that plan for inclusion in the Auckland Council's Annual Operational Plan 2022/23 process.

The Tūpuna Maunga Authority and Auckland Council are required to approve the Annual Operational Plan. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority Operational Plan 2022/23 must be considered and adopted concurrently with the Auckland Council's Operational Plan 2022/23. A summary of the Tūpuna Maunga Authority's indicative funding requirements are outlined in this Section.

NGĀ MANA WHENUA O TĀMAKI MAKAURAU

Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau negotiated a collective settlement of their historical Treaty claims with the Crown. Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau is the collective name of the 13 iwi/hapū with historical Treaty claims in wider Tāmaki Makaurau. The iwi/hapū are grouped into the following three rōpū:

THE NGĀ MANA WHENUA O TĀMAKI MAKAURAU COLLECTIVE REDRESS ACT 2014

The Collective Redress Act 2014 vested the Crown owned land in 14 Tūpuna Maunga (ancestral mountains) in Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau. They are held for the common benefit of the iwi/hapū of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau and the other people of Auckland. The Tūpuna Maunga are vested as reserves under the Reserves Act 1977.

CO-GOVERNANCE

The Act also established the Tūpuna Maunga Authority, a bespoke co-governance entity, to administer the Tūpuna Maunga.

The Authority has six representatives from Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau, six from Auckland Council and one non-voting Crown representative appointed by the Minister for Arts, Culture and Heritage. The term of the Authority aligns with the term of the Council.

Under the Act, the Tūpuna Maunga Authority is the administering body for each Maunga for the purposes of the Reserves Act 1977, with two exceptions of Maungauika / North Head and Rarotonga / Mount Smart.

Maungauika / North Head has previously been administered by the Crown (Department of Conservation) but has now been transferred to the Tūpuna Maunga Authority. Routine management is now undertaken by council under the direction of the Tūpuna Maunga Authority in the same way as for the other Maunga.

Responsibility for administration and management of Rarotonga / Mount Smart remains with Auckland Council (Regional Facilities Auckland) under the Mount Smart Regional Recreation Centre Act 1985 and Reserves Act 1977.

The Tūpuna Maunga Authority is also the administering body for Te Pane-o-Mataaho / Te Ara Pueru / Māngere Mountain and the Maungakiekie / One Tree Hill northern land.

The legislation provides for funding and staff resourcing through Auckland Council. The Authority is currently supported by a core team of eight council staff across the Governance and Parks, Sport and Recreation units.

The scale of this co-governance arrangement is unparalleled in Auckland and the resulting unified and cohesive approach to caring for the Maunga has garnered widespread support.

STRATEGIC FRAMEWORK:

TŪPUNA MAUNGA INTEGRATED MANAGEMENT PLAN

The Tūpuna Maunga Integrated Management Plan ("IMP") sets the foundations for how the Tūpuna Maunga are valued, protected, restored, enhanced, and managed in the future with equal consideration and reverence. The IMP established a set of Values for the Tūpuna Maunga which are outlined below.

The IMP was developed in accordance with Section 41 of the Reserves Act to provide for and ensure the use, enjoyment, maintenance, protection, preservation, and development as appropriate for the reserve purposes for which each of the Tūpuna Maunga is classified. This single integrated plan replaces the former separate legacy reserve management plans for the Tūpuna Maunga.

The IMP was approved in 2016 following a public consultation process and are available at www.maunga.nz.

TŪPUNA MAUNGA INTEGRATED MANAGEMENT PLAN STRATEGIES

The Tūpuna Maunga Integrated Management Plan Strategies are the next level of policy development for the Tūpuna Maunga and aim to support the Values and Pathways in the Tūpuna Maunga Integrated Management Plan 2016.

The IMP Strategies was approved in 2019 following a public consultation process and are available at www.maunga.nz.

TŪPUNA MAUNGA VALUES

Within the Tūpuna Maunga Integrated Management Plan, the Tūpuna Maunga Authority has articulated a set of values of the Tūpuna Maunga. The values promote the statutory purpose of the Tūpuna Maunga under section 109 of the Collective Redress Act, where in exercising its powers and functions the Authority must have regard to the spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary and historical significance of the Tūpuna Maunga to Ngā Mana Whenua.

The values provide a strategic framework to guide the Tūpuna Maunga Authority in making any decision about the Tūpuna Maunga.

The values weave together and give expression to mana whenua and other world views, and the connections and histories in a manner that highlights the way in which these views complement each other and create a richness to the relationship people have with the Tūpuna Maunga and multiple ways in which ways in which these relationships are thought of and expressed.

TŪPUNA MAUNGA OPERATIONAL PLAN 2022/23

Each financial year, the Tūpuna Maunga Authority and Council must agree an annual operational plan to provide a framework in which the Council will carry out its functions for the routine management of the Tūpuna Maunga and administered lands for that financial year, under the direction of the Tūpuna Maunga Authority.

The Tūpuna Maunga Operational Plan 2022/23 identifies a number of projects to be delivered or commenced in the coming financial year and the subsequent two financial years. The Tūpuna Maunga Operational Plan 2022/23 also sets out the 10-year work programme and funding envelope confirmed through the Long Term Plan 2021-2031. The budget for 2022/23 and the subsequent years fits within this funding envelope.

- Progressing the potential transfer of administration over certain Maunga reserve lands from the Department of Conservation to the Authority, and the potential transfer of the administration of land contiguous to other Tūpuna Maunga
- Establishment of a compliance programme including a review of current and establishment of appropriate bylaws.
- Development of individual Tūpuna Maunga plans which reflect the Integrated Values and Pathways, overarching guidelines and strategies for each of the Tūpuna Maunga.

All projects are designed to deliver outcomes for the 13 iwi/hapū of the Tāmaki Collective and all the people of Auckland, enhance the mana and mauri of the Tūpuna Maunga and deliver improved open spaces across the eight local board areas.

They will also enable a compelling case in a future UNESCO World Heritage bid for the Tūpuna Maunga, which will contribute to a Māori identity that is Auckland's point of difference in the world. The bid for World Heritage status will require a dedicated resource and will continue to be progressed in this financial year in partnership with the Department of Conservation.

1. Key highlights in this quarter:

Public Information Programme – Protect your Maunga

Quarter 1 of 2021 / 2022 financial year has seen Tāmaki Makaurau in COVID-19 lockdowns. While a number of services were suspended through Alert Level 4 (17 August to 21 September 2021) the majority of projects, operational and conservation work recommenced at Alert Level 3.1 from 22 September meeting strict COVID-19 protocols.

The Maunga have been an important sanctuary for the people of Tāmaki Makaurau over this time and the Maunga have seen an increase in usage.

During this quarter, the Authority commenced an important public information programme, encouraging members of the public to recognise of the significance of Ngā Tūpuna Maunga and to treat them with care. This was supported by a number of stakeholders (including lessees) who assisted in distribution of this message.

Planting Season Completed – Restoration Programme efforts continued through July with the last two community planting events taking place at Ōtāhuhu / Mt Richmond and Puketāpapa / Pukewīwi / Mt Roskill. A total of 37,202 plants were planted over the course of the Planting season.

Weddings Policy – The Tūpunā Maunga Authority further developed its policy work through adoption of a weddings policy at Hui 65 (26 July 2021), enabling appropriate use of particular areas on the Tūpuna Maunga.

Events Online – Online forms published on to www.maunga.nz, enabling faster turnaround and easier processing of event applications.

Tūpuna Maunga – Management of fire risks

Purpose	To inform the Tūpuna Maunga Authority of the steps being taken to minimise fire risk on the Tūpuna Maunga.
Recommendations	That the Tūpuna Maunga Authority: a) note the protection measures for the Tūpuna Maunga over the 2021-22 summer period as set out in the report

Background

1. Fire is a significant Health and Safety risk for the Tūpuna Maunga Authority.
2. As reported at Hui 51 (10 February 2021), since 2019 the Maunga have suffered from 5 large fires. All of these fires have been caused by fireworks or started under suspicious circumstances.
3. Since that time Management have developed operating procedures to manage the health and safety risk. These procedures have been developed alongside Fire and Emergency New Zealand (FENZ) and in collaboration with our Full Facility Maintenance Contract. Management provided the list of fire management practices at Hui 67 (27 September 2021).
4. Fire Management protocols on the Tūpuna Maunga are based on seasonal risk levels. To prepare for the dry summer season, Management works through a number of aspects of fire management which include:
 - Team training
 - Firebreak mowing and vegetation maintenance
 - Ensuring turf management is adhered to along hard surface/road corridors
 - Ensuring that water access and supply is available to FENZ in the case of an emergency
 - Management work with FENZ and are notified by FENZ of any high risk fire times, especially during very dry weather
 - General waste removal and physical work waste removal is undertaken and monitored
 - Physical works activities are monitored, and higher risk equipment used in controlled environments
 - Ensuring contractors are equipped with mobile fire management equipment
 - Building Fire systems are checked
 - Providing FENZ with up-to-date access maps for each site including gate codes and assembly points
 - Ensuring health and safety plans comply
 - Security services established during high-risk periods, such as Guy Fawkes and New Year's Eve.

Statutory Context

5. Any decision to determine management within a reserve must take into account the legislative and policy framework.
6. Section 109(2) of Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 requires the Authority to have regard to the spiritual, ancestral, cultural, customary, and historical significance of the Maunga to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau and that the Tūpuna Maunga is held in trust for Ngā Mana Whenua and the other people of Auckland.
7. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority's Integrated Management Plan was adopted by the Authority pursuant to the Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014 and Reserves Act 1977. The Integrated Management Plan describes a series of "Values" and "Pathways" that guide all activities on the Tūpuna Maunga.
8. The Tūpuna Maunga Authority adopted the Tūpuna Maunga Strategies at Hui 50 on 25 September 2020. The Tūpuna Maunga Strategies are 7 key sections that outline the strategic direction with regards to education, Biodiversity, Tūpuna Maunga design, Recreation, commercial activities and monitoring. Together with the IMP, these strategies inform guide and manage the activities undertaken on the Maunga.
9. The Authority administers the Tūpuna Maunga under the Reserves Act 1977 and pursuant to Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau Collective Redress Act 2014. The Hauraki Gulf Marine Park Act 2000 is also applicable in relation to Maungauika.

Firebreaks

10. As part of the ongoing Tūpuna Maunga maintenance programme, FENZ recommended that firebreaks are mowed around the perimeter of the Maunga to reduce the risk of fire to and from adjoining properties.
11. Two rounds of firebreaks were completed during August through November 2021. The firebreaks will then audited by Management to ensure that they meet requirements.
12. Staff work closely with FENZ to ensure the approach to firebreaks is consistent with best practice and agree the specific areas to be mowed. These areas are reviewed with FENZ on an annual basis, the last Maunga review by FENZ occurred on 22/07/2021.
13. FENZ also undertake safety drills on the Maunga and Tūpuna Maunga operations staff also undertake drills for response to deal with emergencies such as fires should they occur. FENZ have unrestricted access to the tihi via an access code to entrance gates, which has worked well when fire events have occurred.

Guy Fawkes Preparedness

14. On Monday 11 October 2021, Management sent a letter to all stakeholders including Councillors, Local Boards, Lease Holders and resident and ratepayers reminding them that we are entering the Fire Season and reminding them that the Maunga will be closed during the week of Guy Fawkes. The letter has been sent to all properties surrounding the Maunga on Thursday 14 October.

15. Signage was erected on all of the Maunga from Wednesday 21 October notifying people that the Maunga will be closed during Guy Fawkes.
16. Security contractors were on site during the week of Guy Fawkes and undertook patrols the following week.
17. The Maunga was closed to the public after 7.30pm for the week of that fireworks are on sale with security services on site.
18. Management is pleased to advise that to date through the Guy Fawkes period, there have been no incidents involving fireworks on the Maunga. Attachment A is an Authority press release of 9 November 2021 advising that there were no fires on the Maunga over the period.

Next Steps

19. Firebreak mowing will continue through the summer period (and specific work was completed ahead of the Guy Fawkes Period).
20. Management will also provide ongoing updates throughout the fire season.

The Tūpuna Maunga Authority acknowledges Mana Whenua and the local communities of Tāmaki Makaurau for their support of the successful second annual closure of the Tūpuna Maunga to protect the Maunga from fireworks damage.

To avoid the risk of devastating fireworks fires seen in the past, all 14 ancestral mountains were closed overnight during Guy Fawkes week when fireworks were on sale, and the weekend immediately following. The Maunga were patrolled by dedicated security personnel at a significant cost.

The overwhelming public response was one of strong support. Many folk expressed gratitude for the Authority's mahi which not only protects the taonga but reduces risk to people and property and avoids strain on Fire and Emergency services.

While there were a handful of incidents from a few who feel entitled to light fireworks wherever and whenever they want, along with some alcohol abuse, the great majority were understanding and in favour of the initiative to close the Maunga during Guy Fawkes.

Chair of the Authority, Paul Majurey, says, 'Closing the Tūpuna Maunga is an absolute measure of last resort. We know how important the taonga are to people - and this has been even more evident during this extensive lockdown - they lend a sense of peace during these challenging times. Closing the Maunga comes at a considerable cost, but

this has again proved effective in preventing the devastating fire damage caused by fireworks.’

Cr Alf Filipaina, Deputy Chair of the Authority, says, ‘We’d also like to reiterate our applause for The Warehouse, who have ceased selling fireworks because they understand the dangers they pose – and encourage all other retailers to follow suit. We will continue to close the Maunga every Guy Fawkes week until the government legislates to stop the sales of fireworks to the public.’

The Tūpuna Maunga Authority is clear that the annual closures will be normal business for so long as the public can buy fireworks.

Maunga Tracks project update

The impact of the continuing lockdown and issues with materials supply has meant that some of the construction programmes have extended into the end of summer 2022.

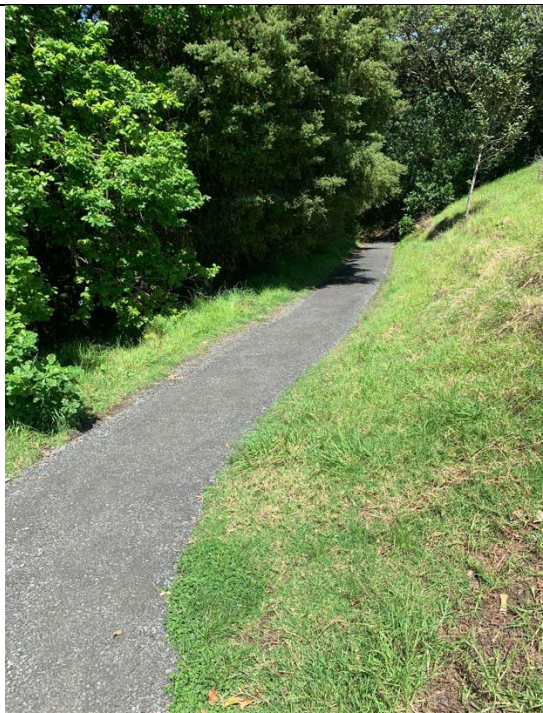
